

# Man Gets 30 Days; Charge, Petty Larceny

Ralph Richard Newell, 30, pleaded guilty to petty larceny yesterday afternoon in justice court and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

Newell also paid a \$50 fine. He was accused of stealing \$2.30 from the till of a local restaurant while employed as a cook.

Others Jailed  
Several other persons were admitted to the county lockup yesterday afternoon and last night and one, Norman Lester Chockfoot, 22, of Beatty, posted \$50 bail on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor.

Albert Leroy Brooks, 51, of Sprague River, was committed to serve out a \$54.50 fine assessed for furnishing liquor to an Indian. He was sentenced in the Sprague River district justice court at Bly.

C. H. Parks, 18, of Sprague River, was booked as over leave from the navy.

Payne Robinson Bailey, 38, was booked for being drunk on a public highway after arrest by state police on highway 66 and his companion, William Gerald Davis, 41, for failure to drive on the right side of the highway.

# Hulett Pleads Innocent On Vice Counts

NEWELL—Clarence Hulett, Negro camp manager at the transient workers camp here, entered a plea of not guilty to eight counts at a hearing held here Tuesday morning.

Hulett's arrest, along with a number of others at the camp, was made by Modoc county authorities last week when District Attorney Charles Lederer said the camp held "the most flagrant violation of law enforcement" ever seen in Modoc county.

Charges  
Hulett is represented by Attorney Joseph Corrales of Yreka. He is specifically charged with operating a poker game, running a dice game, operating slot machines, three charges of selling liquor without licenses, procuring girls as barmaids to sell liquor, maintaining a house of prostitution.

Lederer said Hulett would be tried on each charge, the first to come up on October 24 here.

Not Guilty  
Two Negroes arrested on charges of dealing in gambling games entered pleas of not guilty. They are Russ Hall and Henry Jenkins. Date of trial has not been set.

Two of the three Negro women arrested on charges of prostitution entered pleas of guilty and paid \$50 fines. They are Alice Dean and Stella Fields. Stella told the court she had been hired by Hulett and was to pay him \$35 per week on top of 50 per cent of all liquor sales.

Alice said she also had been hired by Hulett and gave him 8 per cent of the liquor sales she made.

The third woman, Louise Taylor, is out on bail and her hearing is yet to come up.

# Divorce Case Settled; Fund Deal Secret

An out-of-court settlement has been reached to call off content of a divorce action brought by Regis T. de Maleissey, French army veteran, against his German bride, Annel Charlotte Promm de Maleissey.

The divorce proceeding was to have begun today in circuit court, but in its stead de Maleissey appeared to seek a default decree.

After perfunctory testimony on his part, a decree was withheld pending satisfaction of terms of the property settlement.

Secret  
The settlement was kept secret. Mrs. de Maleissey had asked for \$200,000 in cash, \$2000 a month support money, \$25,000 attorney fees and a half interest in de Maleissey's big Wagon Trail ranch located in northern Klamath county near Lapine.

Assets of de Maleissey, according to court reports, amount to over \$600,000, left him by a grandmother and held in trust funds in New York, but his income from the funds is said to be only about \$16,000 a year.

In his divorce complaint, the 32-year-old Frenchman claimed his wife was working as a \$12-a-week housemaid prior to their marriage in New York City, February 3, 1947, and said he had information she had been a member of the Nazi party in Germany. Annel, who left de Maleissey in June to go back to New York, is 22.

They bought the Wagon Trail ranch in July, 1947.

City police said they were called to the Holly hotel by the disturbance and found Frank Thiefaul, 44, in a washroom trying to wash away the blood from several cuts on Wright's head.

Bottle Blows  
Investigation determined Thiefaul had struck Wright several times with a broken bottle, leaving cuts on the Indian's right ear and forehead.

The third person arrested was an Indian woman, Alameda Bzanz, 49, who was present at the time of the fight.

# Indictment Ordered Resubmitted

An indictment against Louis E. Murphy, 21, returned secretly by the grand jury last April, will be resubmitted to the grand jury because of a clerical error.

Murphy was indicted for larceny by embezzlement, accused of passing bad checks by representing himself to be timekeeper of the Arundel Construction company. He was taken into custody recently in Omaha, Neb.

In circuit court this morning Deputy District Attorney Ben Goddard moved to have the indictment resubmitted to the grand jury and the motion was granted by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

E. E. Driscoll, attorney for Murphy, asked to have his client's bail requirement reduced from \$2500 to \$1500 but Judge Vandenberg withheld action on that request.

Murphy is held in the county jail.

The mercury hit a seasonal low of 13 above zero in Crater Lake national park here this morning, second lowest in the records of the park for the month of October. It hit 10 above once during the month, records show.

The two are said to have been embroiled in a fight on October 12, one half block off the Main street, and at the corner of Carlos and Howard, when Hawthorne allegedly hurled a rock, striking Wilson. The Indian died at his home in the Indian village near town, last Thursday.

'Justifiable'  
The jury returned a verdict of justifiable homicide.

Hawthorne was arrested at his rooming house by Special Investigator Wayne Orr and Undersheriff Jack Stark. Wayman had been drinking, it is understood. The quarrel took place in front of the Plaindealer, Alturas' newspaper.
