

# Congressmen Go Home to Learn How People Feel

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—With a 75-day breather ahead, members of congress went home today to listen to the voters' ideas about how to run the country.

Behind them left, along with their accomplishments, an imposing array of issues settled only temporarily—or not at all—in a 289-day session of the democratic-controlled congress.

But it had been a busy, if sometimes an acrimonious, session, and the lawmakers greeted adjournment joyfully on both sides of Capitol Hill.

There was some horseplay there were a few notes of criticism. And there was a congratulatory message from President Truman to send the legislators on their way.

**Worth While**  
The president noted in letters to House Speaker Rayburn and Vice President Barkley, the senate's presiding officer, that it had been a long, hard session. Then he added: "I am confident that the American people will agree that the results have been well worth while."

In the house chamber, three groups who work for congressional committees presented the representatives with "The Eyes of Texas" and "Down By The Old Mill Stream."

**Ribbing**  
In the senate, Senator Donnell (R-Mo) slyly poked fun at Barkley for his reported romance with Mrs. Carleton S. Hadley, St. Louis widow. Barkley responded in kind.

At Donnell's invitation to visit Missouri during the recess, Barkley grinned broadly. Maybe, he said as the senate chuckled, but "not in my capacity as vice president."

The lawmakers face a heavy schedule when they return in January. Awaiting them will be such warmed-over international problems as that of extending the European recovery and foreign arms assistance programs, as well as such recurring domestic issues as rent control, extension of the low-rent housing program and repeal of the Taft-Hartley act.

**Side-track**  
But some of these may have to yield the spotlight to more controversial measures.

Among those certain to be resubmitted by Truman are proposals for compulsory health insurance and enactment of civil rights legislation.

He also might ask for an extension of the military draft, which has not operated for several months in addition to a test of the Brannan farm subsidy payments plan.

and that means that every worker will have to complete assignments without delay," Hamaker said.

**48 Failure**  
While the \$65,541 objective of the 1949 appeal is slightly below the 1948 goal, Hamaker pointed out that the campaign last year failed to reach its quota.

All of the chest agencies are operating at a very minimum of expense and we must not fail to realize our full goal this year," he declared.

The accent of the campaign this year will be the provision of funds for youth activities. By far the bulk of all money raised in the appeal will go directly to financing agencies which work with boys and girls in the county and for state agencies which care for infants and dependent boys and girls.

**Shares**  
Heading the list of local agencies will be the Boy Scouts with a budget of \$12,134.65 as that agency's share of the \$65,541 objective. Other agencies which will share in the fund and their individual budgets are: Camp Fire Girls, \$6566.40; Girl Scouts, \$7930.75; Salvation Army, \$10,560; YMCA, \$8736; Klamath Falls Teen-Age club, \$3840; Chiloquin Teen-Age club, \$870; Merrill Teen-Age club, \$1000, and a total of \$8403.20 for the 15 agencies which participate in the Oregon State Chest. Total campaign expenses and administration and audit of all funds raised will not exceed \$5500.
