

### Banks Starts New 'Register' Check' Forms

An entirely new type of checking service, called "register checks," has been introduced this week by the United States National bank, E. C. Sammons, president, announced.

The unique feature of register checks is that the customer may write a personal check without being required to open or maintain a checking account, according to E. H. Thompson, manager of the United States National's Klamath Falls branch.

**Simple**  
In operation, the service is extremely simple. The user merely fills out the register check and attached stub in his own handwriting and presents it at the register check window. The teller then numbers check and stub and puts both through the photostatic machine. The stub serves as the customer's receipt.

Since register checks are governed by the laws and practices applying to personal checks, they may be certified and payment may be stopped.

**Advantage**  
The advantage of register checks over other methods of remittance such as money orders, Thompson pointed out, is that they are made out in the customer's own handwriting and appear to be personal checks. Also, they are less expensive than most money orders.

Register checks cost 15 cents each and may be issued in any amount up to \$100. They will be available at all offices of the United States National bank.

First introduced by a Boston bank, register checks are widely used throughout the East, according to Thompson. However, this is the first time they have been available in Oregon.

### Radio Dogs Work For Science

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Dogs sporting built-in radio receivers beneath their skin are working for science.

And they're doing a good job—although they get off to a bad start by helping interfere with radio reception in Albany, N. Y.

The American College of Surgeons was told yesterday by an Albany doctor that tiny radio receivers are buried beneath the pooch's skin between the shoulder blades.

**Idea**  
The general idea of the set-up is this:

The radio receivers are tuned to a particular frequency, enabling scientists to stimulate the dog's nerves by remote control.

When the radio signal is received, it is converted to electrical energy which is then transmitted over a wire in the dog's body to any nerve the scientist wants to study.

The researchers are using the method to try to match the electrical stimulation of nerves that goes on under both normal and abnormal psychological conditions in the body.

**Tiny Set**  
The actual radio receiver is only an inch and one-quarter in diameter.

The receiver is a perfect sphere enclosed in a plastic non-irritating substance. It is connected by means of a plastic enclosed special wire to a tiny silver foil electrode which can be fitted over a nerve like a collar.

When the dogs were all set, the scientists started broadcasting to them on a frequency of 1000 kilocycles—a frequency which happens to be right smack in the middle of the commercial broadcast band.

**Interference**  
"We found," reported Dr. John J. Farrell of Albany Medical college, "that we were interfering with the reception of one of the local radio stations."

Farrell and his associates then made adjustments in their procedure.

### Butcher Cuts Own Hole For Appendectomy

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 20 (AP)—A Raleigh butcher accidentally carved the incision for his own appendectomy.

John C. Sykes, 25-year-old meat cutter, told his story yesterday from his bed at Rex hospital here.

Joking as he went along, Sykes related how on last Friday afternoon he was slicing veal cutlets.

At one point, his razor-sharp, 12-inch knife blade got stuck in the meat and he yanked it out. As it came out, he lost control and the blade slashed his side.

At the hospital it was found the butcher's wound could nearly pass as a double for an appendectomy incision.

In addition, Sykes said, the knife had damaged his appendix to the point it was necessary to remove it.

### Portlanders, Tub Soakers

PORTLAND, Oct. 20 (AP)—Portlanders are going in more extensively for a long soak in a deep tub. That's what Public Works Commissioner William Bowers says. He arrived at his conclusion this way: At the end of 1948 there were 97,743 water connections in the city, an increase of 10 per cent since

1941. In the same period, use of water went up about 25 per cent. Bowers said it's a well known fact that bath taking constitutes the largest single use of water.

So: "If the people are using more water it's because they are taking more baths."

### Race Tax Boosts Quail Welfare

SACRAMENTO (AP)—The California quail, after a century of being hunted by palefaces and having his cover, food supply and watering places taken by same, is about to

enter the welfare state. The California paleface likes to bet on horses, and his state levies a tax thereon which is applied to game conservation.

Some \$375,000 of this is to be used during the next three years to build watering devices, feeding grounds, and brush shelters for California quail. The federal government, under the Pittman-Robertson act, will almost double the ante with another \$640,000.

California has been working on this for some time, and already has 500 automatic "quail quaffeterias" working. They are concrete cisterns

that catch rain during the wet season and dole it out through the dry months when millions of baby quail would otherwise die of thirst.
