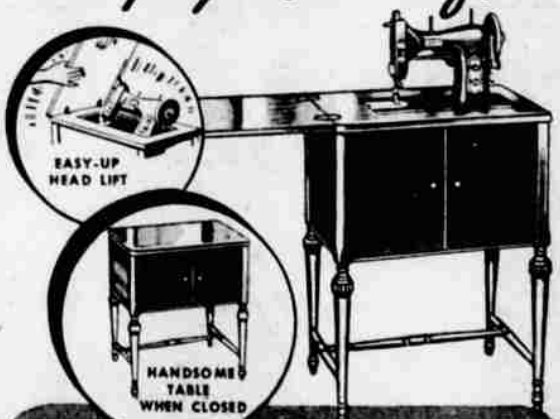

He has been a favorite with Midwest dancers for many years. His band replaces Guy Lombardo's at the Roosevelt hotel in New York each summer during Guy's vacation.

His music satisfies every type of dancer from the young to the old. He is famous for his polkas and schottisches.

He is one of the few leaders in the country to feature both an electric organ and a celeste.

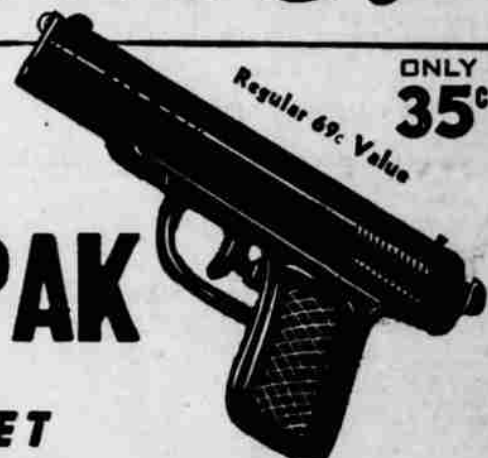
