Scoring Rampant Have you noticed the scarcity of scoreless games in major football skirmishes this season?

This subject bobbed up during an informal gabfest recently. Personally I can't offhand think of any major game ending scoreless thus far in the season.

In connection with this, a group of leading pigskin mentors assembled for a discussion of this matter.

Many of them voiced the opinion that it was the extensive use of the pylon system that caused "baseball" grid scores. Others dissented.

I personally agreed with the published statement of Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson who attributed the ballooning of scores to intricate offensive maneuvers.

Many teams now work 10 or 12 variations of attack from one formation, Wilkinson argued. He cited Nebraska which has 14 variations from the T formation.

"A team can't get ready for that many," Wilkinson argues logically. Henry Franks of Tulane, whose team was drubbed by Notre Dame, 46 to 7, turning a supposedly close game into a rout, cracked: "Large scores usually result from the ability of the winner to get there 'fustest with the mostest'."

Franks won't get much argument on that down-to-earth statement.

Axe in Reverse, 27 to 7 PELS DRUB LUMBERJACKS IN NON-LEAGUE TANGLE

By RED HURD A poised Pelican grid team did little more than work up a healthy sweat last night on Modoc field against a king-of-X opponent, Longview, to rack up a convincing 27 to 7 victory.

The Lumberjack score late in the last quarter against Pelican reserves served little more than add an anti-climax to a methodical Klamath victory.

Longview unfurled a passing attack that ended in a 13-yard touchdown dash by Quarterback Jerry Marsh with the Pelicans holding a 27-0 bulge. Chuck Merishing made the kick good.

The Pelicans scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second to hold a 20 to 0 halftime lead. Klamath reserves added a third-period score.

Roy Lundgren opened the door for the Pels midway in the opening quarter when he intercepted one of Marsh's passes and was grounded on the Lumberjack 47-yard line.

Big Joe Demetrakos, Gene Carlson and Joe Nichols took turns in advancing the ball to the one-foot line in 10 plays from where Demetrakos boomed over for the opening score. Only four minutes, 25 seconds remained in the first quarter.

Dale Carr was rushed into the fray and missed the only one of his four tries for extra points when the Jack forward laid poured in to block the placement.

SAME TIME Coincidentally, the big clock on the north end of Modoc field showed again only 4:25 in the second quarter when Joltin' Joe Demetrakos added another score with a four-yard off tackle smack. Carr's kick split the uprights.

A fumble set up the second score and again Marsh was the scapegoat. After the Pels were stopped by Longview on the Lumberjack 19-yard line, the Washington team took over. Actually, the bobbie by Marsh resulted from a badly-executed statue of liberty from punt formation on fourth down.

The ball bounded loose and Guard Bob Boudin recovered on Longview's 21-yard line. Two line blasts worked the ball to the 15 from where Tom McPherson rifled a pass to Tom Schubert on the four-yard marker. The Pelican left end caught the pass, fumbled but recovered.

Gavilan Upset by Unknown Fans, Scribes Hoot Decision By Les Felton

DETROIT, Oct. 22 (AP)—East Side Detroit, which gave Joe Louis and Sugar Ray Robinson to the boxing world, had a new fistic star today—a clever young negro welterweight named Lester Felton.

Felton's star was beclouded, however, by circumstances surrounding his upset victory over the highly regarded Kid Gavilan of Cuba in a 10-round fight at Olympia last night.

The 20-year-old Detroitter was awarded a severely criticized split decision after he outran Gavilan for practically the entire 10 rounds before 13,184 fans who paid a gross rate of \$29,750.

Gavilan, ranked as the No. 1 contender for Robinson's welterweight crown, was a 3-1 favorite at ringside, but he spent practically the whole fight in futile efforts to corner Felton.

Felton used to be one of Gavilan's sparring partners in New York and the experience he gained in those hours in the gym paid off for him in a big way.

He scurried backwards, flicking out a long left to bother Gavilan considerably, and it was only in the 8th and 10th that the Detroitter stood still for some toe-to-toe slugfests.

The scrap was supposed to be just another stopover for the busy little Gavilan who beat Beau Jack at Chicago October 14 and has a date to meet Steve Belloise in a 10-rounder at Cleveland October 31.

Newspapermen were amazed. Veteran Sports Writer Sam Green of the Detroit News called it "the worst decision I've ever seen."

Tommy Devine of the Detroit Free Press described it as "a fantastic verdict."

The cards of Greene, Devine and the Associated Press showed Felton winning only one round—the eight in which he stopped running long enough to trade a few punches with Gavilan.

Chairman Floyd Stevens of the Michigan boxing commission was at ringside and he indicated the commission would make a study of the fight result.

Owls, Wolves Fight Tonight

OEC Favored to Run Victory Grid Skin to Five Straight The Oregon Tech Owls will try to even up its won-and-lost record tonight on Modoc field but a series of injuries and an unbeaten Southern Oregon college team makes such a feat highly improbable.

OC Coach Bill McArthur is packing 40 players into private cars for the trip south. Advance publicity from the Monmouth campus indicates that the McArthurites are not particularly worried about the Owl football talent but seem concerned about the cold weather here.

The Monmouth Touchdown Twins, Corky Van Loo and Robin Lee, may not see much action tonight. McArthur doesn't want to risk losing the halfback pair for the homecoming game against Eastern Oregon college next week.

Prime ball-carrying duties will probably fall to Ralph "Scooter" Capasso who, along with Van Loo and Lee, has scored four touchdowns apiece for the Wolves in conquests this season.

The Wolves, in four wins against no defeats this year, have racked up 111 to opponents' 27. Last week in OCE's 25 to 13 drubbing of Vanport, the Wolves netted 360 yards to Vanport's 73.

At this writing it looks, however, that the Owls will have three advantages, playing on its home field and familiarity with the colder weather and the psychological edge of underdogs.

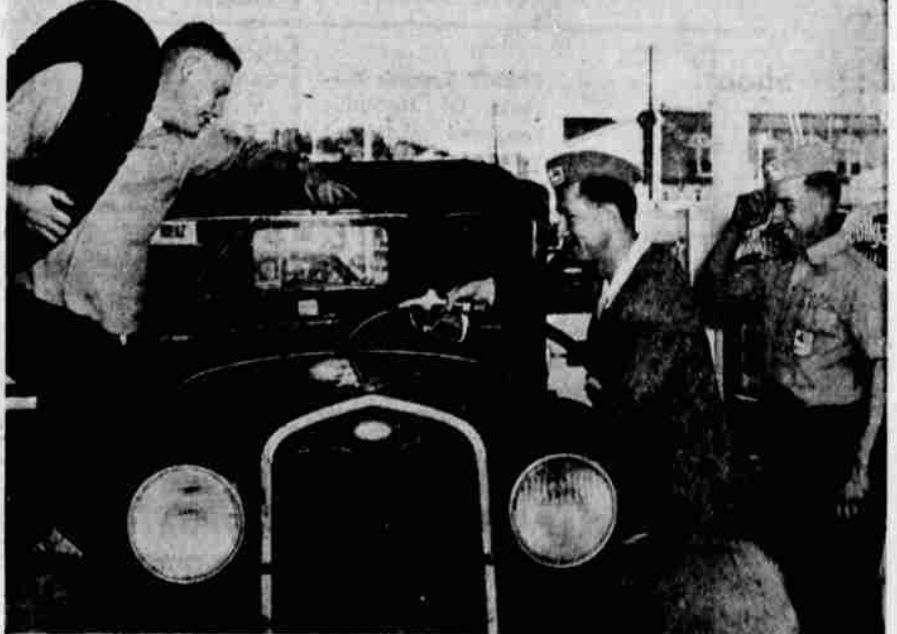
