

Woman of the Week Is Interesting Speaker

Mrs. Johann Uherek, our "Woman of the Week," is a most interesting person, which her charming house reflects. The Uhereks' home in Olene is filled with remembrances of old Europe, including two unusual antique clocks. Her collections of crested cups and spoons are evidence of the European cities she has visited.

Annely Uherek, as she is well known in the Klamath basin, has given lectures to many service clubs since her return from Europe following the war. She has spoken to Rotary and Lions clubs, Klamath Art association, Library and Sororist club, and the Tullake Rotary club. Her topics have ranged from the appreciation of art and human relations to observations of conditions in Europe.

Our "Woman of the Week" is well qualified to talk on these subjects. She was born in Vienna, Austria, and began studying languages and dancing at an early age in Switzerland and France. In 1931 she came to the United States and entered the College of the Pacific in Stockton, Calif., and later studied dancing at Mills college in Oakland. She returned to Europe in 1935 to study the trends of the dance, and remained there until after the war.

Mrs. Uherek is making plans for classes in creative dancing and she also plans to supervise a children's player group, which is, as she explains, a spontaneous pantomime of fairy tales by youngsters.

The Uhereks live in Olene with their two children, aged eight and four, and they also maintain a home in Vienna. Mr. Uherek is working for Weyerhaeuser, here. The textile manufacturing company he has in Vienna is being operated by his business partner.

This week's special report is on "Uncle, Aunt and Jezebel" by Martha Hedman.

Martha Hedman has been actress in Europe and in America, and in this book she tells of her experiences in Finland while living with her Uncle and Aunt at the time when Russia ruled and when Helsinki was Helsinki. She gives us many delightful aspects of daily living in Scandinavia.

"Uncle, Aunt and Jezebel" has a flavor of "Life With Father" with the wife directing by remote control. It is a game of food vs. charm. Each has its innings. Each has its reverses and heartaches. Each has its victories.

Uncle Mathias is a prosperous wholesale wine merchant. He is tall, handsome, blustering. His wife is a plain woman, is several years older than he, and is always aware of his infatuation with a charming, beautiful widow whom she designates as Jezebel. Aunt Mathilda conducts a most orderly household and is an artist in the preparation of foods. Her husband loves good food. He greatly respects and admires her traits and speaks of her as a "remarkable woman," but he turns to Jezebel for the sympathies that her charms possess for him. Aunt Mathilda fights this competition with her art of cookery and usually wins.

Martha, the author, is the niece who leaves her home in Northern Sweden to live with Uncle Mathias and Aunt Mathilda. Although she is young, she is very sympathetic and understanding. She loves all three of these people and in her shy quiet way endeavors to help them all. Aunt Mathilda trains her in needlework and cookery, and she diligently follows instructions but also pursues her own ambition to become an actress — an ambition decidedly contrary to that of her Aunt and Uncle for her.
