The Goellers came to Klamath Falls (Linkville then) in September, 1891. This old home has a stone cellar adjoining the kitchen and also a large pantry, screened porches on two sides of the kitchen, trees are in the back yard, while large Lombardy poplars and a massive linden tree are out in front. The place is a splendid picture of the best of the pioneer period in Klamath county.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Horn at the close of cards.

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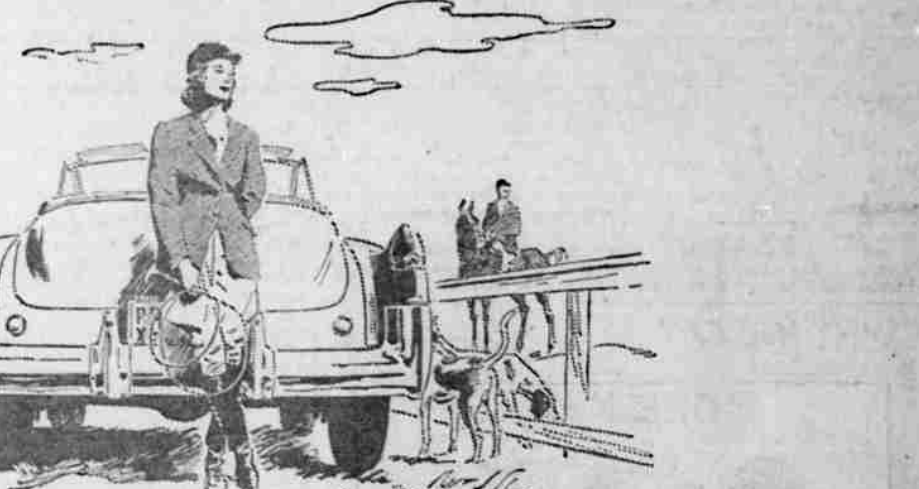
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
