Oregon's Rose Hopes Shattered
Trojans' Second-Half Splurge
Wallops Hapless Ducks, 40-13

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24 (AP)—Southern California came back from the halftime recess to rub out an Oregon lead and go on to score six touchdowns and overwhelm the invaders, 40 to 13, here Saturday.

The loss for all practical purposes dumped the Oregon team from any claim on the Pacific Coast conference bid to the Rose Bowl classic on New Year's Day.

Two field goals in each of the first quarters — kicked by Guard Chet Daniels — gave Oregon a 6-0 halftime edge. The Ducks had completely dominated the offensive play in those quarters. Backs George Bell, Bob Sanders, Woodley Lewis and Earl Stelle combined to roll up 208 yards in gains to a mere 38 yards for USC. Fumbles, however, cost them promised touchdowns twice. Both were inside the enemy 16 yard line.

But on the first play from scrimmage in the second half, Southern Cal Fullback Bill Martin hit Fullback Sanders and USC recovered the fumbled ball on the Oregon 28. The Trojans promptly marched to a touchdown to tie, added two more that period and three in the final quarter. Martin scored the first and Quarterback Jim Powers passed to three others. Others were a 72 yard punt return by Reserve Halfback Johnny Williams and a pass interception by Dean Schneider.

Oregon's lone touchdown was late in the last quarter. It climaxed a 65 yard march and came on Stelle's 16-yard pass to end Darrell Robinson.

USC recovered five Oregon fumbles, intercepted five Oregon passes and ran them back for 101 yards. Passing and kicks returned were about even, but Oregon's spectacular first half performance had rolled up most of its 19 first downs for a total 214 total yards rushing. USC had 16 first downs and 183 net yards rushing.

Franchise Shift Gets WIL Okay
TACOMA, Oct. 24 (AP)—The first definite shift of a Western International league franchise was oked yesterday when directors approved transfer of the Wenatchee franchise to the tri-cities area embracing Kennewick, Pasco and Richland.

The team will be known officially as the "Tri-Cities team." League President Robert B. Abel said. Representatives of the new entry said a 10-acre former vineyard near Kennewick already has been sodded, the diamond platted and work begun on a fence, grandstand and bleachers. The park will seat approximately 5000 fans.

The Tri-Cities Athletic association was represented by Les Babcock, president; Bob Phillips, co-publisher of the Scott Publishing Co., and Harry Owens, Kennewick businessman. Franchise holders were represented by Dick Richards, business manager, and Hunky Shaw of Yakima, part owners of the team. League directors will meet again in Salem November 7.

THEY'RE WHIFFING ROSES

California Bears, UCLA Bruins Clash in Important Coast Gridiron Fight Saturday

The Pacific coast conference's only two undefeated football teams play cut-throat Saturday in their bid for the Rose Bowl.

California, with three league victories, stakes its hopes of returning to Pasadena against University of California at Los Angeles. UCLA has rolled over four conference rivals.

The race goes into late October with two other contenders still in the running. Southern California and Stanford have lost only one conference game each. Oregon's chances were nullified last week by USC.

Comparative performances favor California, which hasn't lost a con-

test in or outside the conference, over UCLA. Lynn Waldorf's charging California club whipped Washington State, 27-20 to keep its conference slate clean.

The single defeat against UCLA was inflicted the week before, a 14-9 reversal gained by Santa Clara, considered the strongest of the coast independents.

Stanford hurled Oregon State, 27-7 to keep its conference hopes alive. Marchie Schwartz' fast team takes on tough Santa Clara this week. The same shapes up as the closest of the lot.

Southern California knocked Oregon out of contention by a 40-13 count. A second half surge turned

the trick, with Quarterback Jim Powers pitching three touchdown passes in the six touchdown comeback.

Two field goals by Chet Daniels, a place kicking guard, gave Oregon a 6-0 lead at the half.

The smashing win gave Southern California a big boost and the Trojans will be strong favorites to outscore Washington this week at Seattle.

Washington State and Oregon State meet at Corvallis. This game shapes up as a close one, although past performances indicate WSC has slightly superior scoring weapons.

Idaho figures to take the University of Portland in stride after walloping Montana, 47-19 last week. Portland, meanwhile, was beaten by Pepperdine, 13-16. Montana and Montana State meet in their annual state rivalry with the former favored.

Oregon travels to Iowa's home field and may be in for a rough afternoon against the big ten team, now riding high along the victory trail.

St. Mary's entertains Drake in a San Francisco contest Friday night. Nevada comes here Sunday for its yearly encounter with University of San Francisco. Nevada beat Fresno State, 34-13 last week.

The USF Dons raced to six second half touchdowns and a 41-14 victory over St. Mary's yesterday although Ace Fullback Ollie Matson was stopped most of the game. Santa Clara, inspired by Fullback Buster Wraith's 87-yard touchdown spree with an intercepted pass, went on to a 27-19 victory over Loyola of Los Angeles.

In posting their fifth straight victory of the season the "Baby Pels" garnered ownership of the 1949 Southern Oregon conference junior varsity title.

In racking up their four touchdowns the Redshirts struck twice via the ground route, and a similar number of times through the air.

Chunky "Moose" Herrera baptized the scoring column at the six-minute mark of the first quarter, packing the leather from the one-yard mark on a center plunge. Dale Carr made good his first of three conversion attempts for the afternoon, and the board read 7-0 for the Pels.

With the second period only two minutes old, KU struck pay territory again, with speedy Roy Davis doing the honors. Sweeping wide around right end on a deceptive reverse, young Roy raced 16 yards unmolested to hit the diagonal chalk marks. Carr missed his only convert try of the day to leave the score 13-0.

With very little time left before the rest period, Simon's boys headed for the goal line once more, this time led by the pitching arm of Bill Toole.
