**Historic Building Site Gets Marker**  
SPOKANE, Oct. 22 (AP)—A monument marking the site of one of the Northwest's first buildings will be dedicated in a ceremony Sunday afternoon.

A 12-foot granite shaft will be placed at the site of Spokane House near the junction of the Spokane and Little Spokane rivers.

Lloyd E. Gandy of Spokane, whose father came to the territory in 1879, will give the principal address. Mrs. Ruth Peeler of Seattle, member of the state park commission, and Chapin Foster of Tacoma, representing the governor, will take part in the program.

**Typhoid Warning in Eugene**
