

Council OK's Recreation Water Deal

In action at the city council meeting last night the council gave approval to a contract submitted by the recreation department covering water rental from the bureau of reclamation and installation of a pumping system to draw water from the canal.

Terms of the contract, instigation of which will initiate irrigation work on Conger field, call for the recreation department to have water rights from the canal on a 25-year lease at a cost of \$58 per year.

Closing
The city also approved a suggestion that all municipal offices be closed on the Saturday following Armistice Day, November 11.

Assistant Fire Chief John W. Corkery broached a problem to the council when he asked what could be done regarding the passage of emergency vehicles at the Main and Esplanade intersection.

Corkery stated that with the installation of traffic islands by the state highway department at the intersection, the problem has arisen as to how the fire department could make a run down Main street when the road was crowded.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas suggested that the city might have to establish some system whereby it would be possible in such instances to control the three way stop light to be erected at the intersection.

Rents
Also up for discussion was a recommendation that a rental list be made up by the city for inter-departmental rent of all mechanical equipment belonging to the city.

The recommendation was approved with the addition that separate rental prices be established for any private concerns wishing to rent city equipment.

City Engineer Thomas submitted to the council a report on improvement unit 104. The report consisted of plans and specifications for construction of paving on High street from 8th to 10th. Two price estimates for the job were submitted. Cost of a concrete surfacing would total \$9172.88, and asphalt paving, \$8238.78.

The council moved that City Attorney Perkins be given the power to inform residents of that area concerning the project and of the date the council will hold a hearing on the proposed work.

Other road work being considered by the street department includes construction of the S. Rogers street improvement and also of rights-of-way in the Lakeside and Riverside additions.

OTI Job Campaign Proves Success

City Accounting System's Revision Urged by Auditor

The city council completed last night their three-session study of an audit report on the city budget for the year 1948 and 1949.

In their perusal of the report city fathers noted that there was a need for establishment of small change funds in the various city departments.

The "general comment" and recommendation section of the audit by J. Paul Matthews, Klamath Falls auditor, cited that there was need for a drastic revision in the accounting methods and records of the city. It was stated that the present accounting system, established

many years ago, was inadequate for business that the city now does.

Ledger Control
Matthews also commented that there should be established a general ledger control in respect to the city's assets and liabilities.

The report stated that city-owned property is materially under insured. It was pointed out that in some instances city property is insured by a "blanket policy" giving only 60 per cent coverage.

A final recommendation by Matthews stated that some change should be made in the estimation of budgets for the various city departments.
