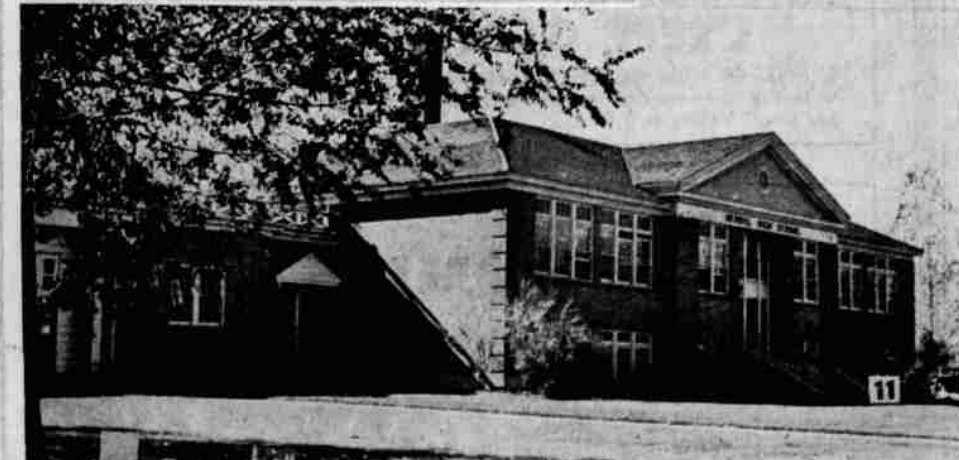
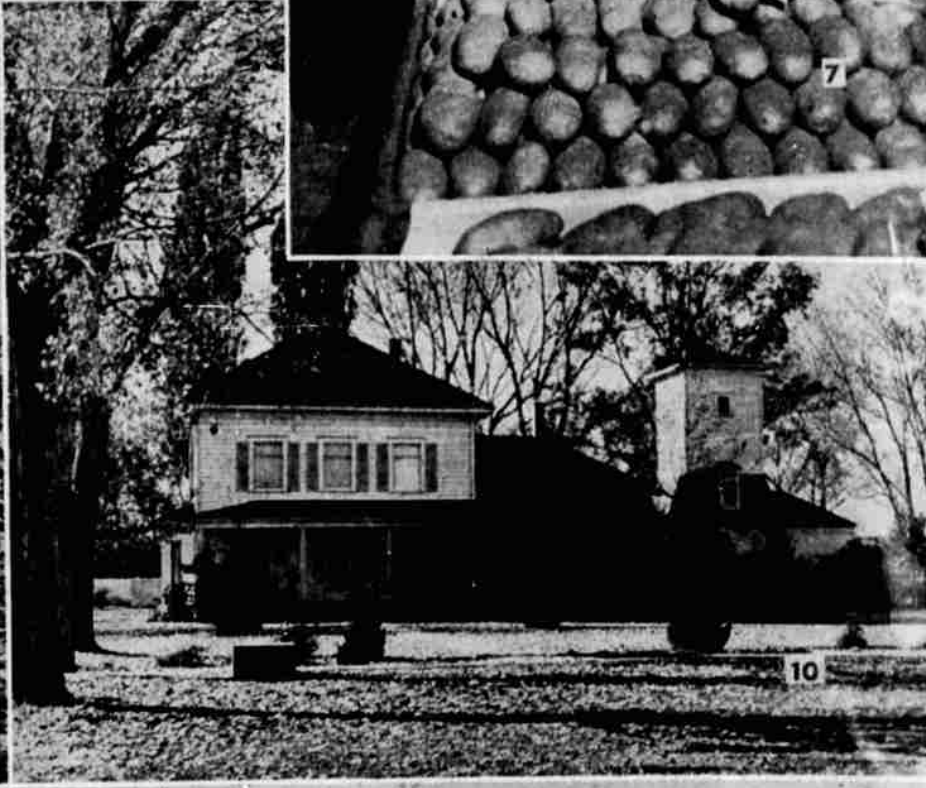
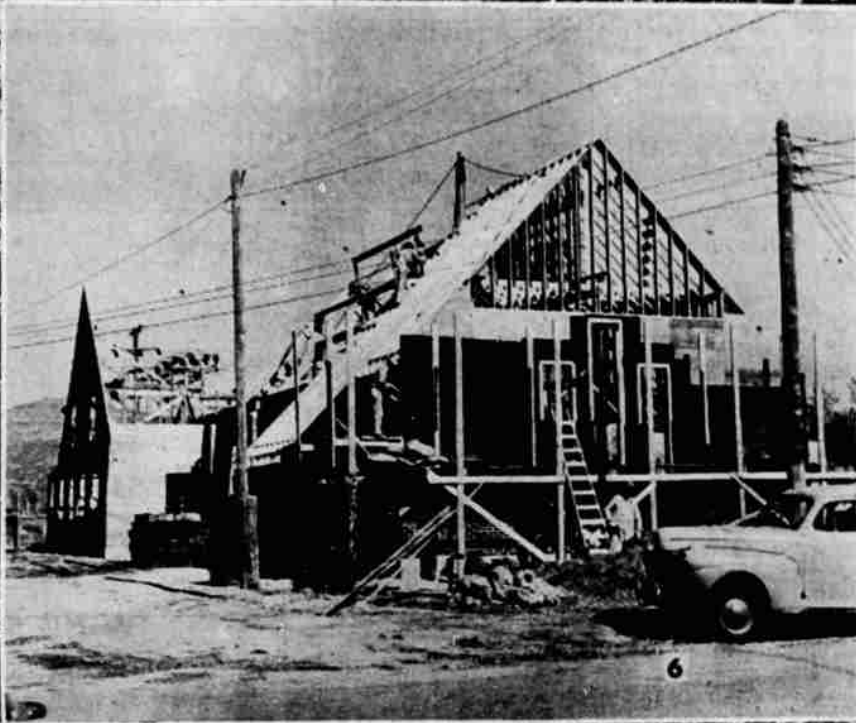
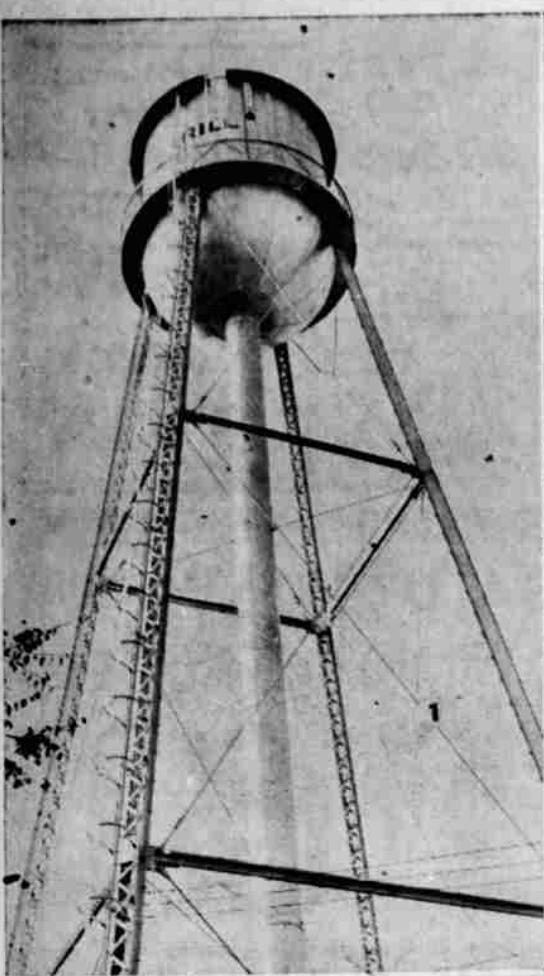


Klamath Falls Salutes Merrill, Home Of The Potato Festival
