

McKay Sees Republicans Holding State Majority, Thinks Morse Will Win

PORTLAND, Oct. 26 (AP)—Governor McKay told a group of newspaper and radio reporters yesterday that he expects the legislature will reappoint the state's legislative districts. He added he would not interfere with the legislators on this subject.

The forum was sponsored by the Press Club of Oregon. The republican governor said he thought the party would retain its majority in Oregon, but he didn't ignore the strength of the democrats. He said there could be a change when the democrats offer better candidates than the republicans.

"There's no use in anybody fooling himself," he said. "Neither the

democrats nor the republicans have any monopoly on brains."

Under questioning, he defined an Oregon republican as a man or woman who "believes in the constitution, is a reasonable businesslike administration, not a lot of wild ideas."

He said he opposed the proposed Columbia valley administration because it would be "a bureaucratic set-up moved out here from Washington."

Oregon, Idaho Truck Pact Renewal Seen

SALEM, Oct. 26 (AP)—Oregon and Idaho are expected next week to resume their agreement to let each other's trucks operate without interference.

Secretary of State Newberry said today that his assistant, William E. Healy, would fly to Boise next Monday to sign a new reciprocity agreement for trucks.

Idaho cancelled its reciprocity agreement with Oregon 18 months ago because Idaho felt that Oregon's 1947 motor transportation law discriminated against Idaho's trucks.

But that was fixed up by the 1949 legislature to Idaho's satisfaction, so Idaho now is willing to join Oregon in breaking down the trade barriers for trucks operating between the two states, Newberry said.

Girl Shortage Poses Problem At OSC

That tireless group, the California chamber of commerce, has just sent in another of their long weekly reports on the general conditions around the state and has this to say about Alturas and Modoc county:

"Beef cattle were the outstanding cash farm crop in Modoc county last year, with a production value of \$3,200,000 out of a total cash return to farmers of \$10,416,000, according to the report of Loring White, county agricultural commissioner."

On top of that they had a barley and wheat crop production value of \$2,750,000 and \$1,200,000 in fruit and truck crops and \$39,000 for beeswax, poultry, eggs, berries and other sundries.
