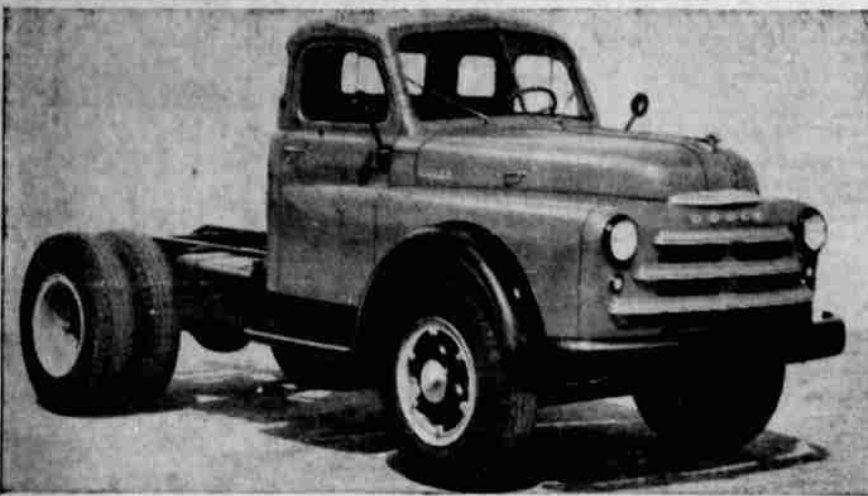


Dodge Offers 356 Truck Models in New Line



Largest truck offered by Dodge in the new line comprising 356 basic models is this VA-150 model with a rating of 23,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, and 40,000 pounds gross combination weight. This model is offered in five wheelbases. It has a 331-cubic-inch engine, sodium-cooled exhaust valves,

silent helical 5-speed transmission with overdrive in fifth available, cyclebonded brake linings, a new electrical system which assists in improved engine performance, steel spoke wheels which reduce unsprung weight and improve brake cooling, and many other new features.

Soybeans Drag Other Grains

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (AP)—Weakness in soybeans acted as a drag on the rest of the grain market today. Beans fell around 2 cents at times, the major loss being shown by the December delivery.

Other grains did not do much. A mild buying flurry pushed prices ahead around mid-day, but the flurry faded.

Wheat closed ½ lower to ¼ higher, December \$2.14½-½, corn was ¼ lower to ½ higher, December \$1.18½-½, oats were ¼-½ higher, December 72½, rye was ½-1½ lower, December \$1.45½, soybeans were 1½-3½ lower, November \$2.26-2.25½, and hard was 3 cents lower to 2 cents a hundred pounds higher, November \$10.45.

Stocks Show Improvements

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (AP)—Numerous key stocks edged up to new highs for the year in a generally improved market today.

Gains ranged from fractions to an extreme of around 2 points. Most additions were a point or less.

Some quarters in the financial district linked the improvement with what had the earmarks of a revival of efforts to settle the steel strikes.

Turnover hit a rate of around 1,500,000 shares for the full session.

Highs for 1949 were hit by—among others—U. S. Steel, General Motors, and Du Pont.

Westinghouse Electric slipped a bit, in the face of news that a 65-cent dividend would raise 1949 payments to \$1.40 a share from \$1.25 paid last year, but later rallied.

Higher prices were paid for Bethlehem Steel, Chrysler, Studebaker, Goodrich Tire, Boeing, Zenith, American Telephone, McIntyre Porcupine, Standard Oil (N.J.), Barnsdall Oil, and Celotex.

Railroad stocks were inclined to hold back.
