SP Appeals Texum Case In Salem

The Southern Pacific yesterday filed a court suit in Salem aimed at setting aside a utilities commissioner order for the railroad to replace an overhead crossing at Texum in Klamath county.

An old frame bridge over the tracks at Texum was torn down by the railroad several years ago. It had little use.

County Won
But Klamath county demanded that it be replaced and several months ago Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg sided with the county and ordered the construction.

The railroad argues that Flagg has no power to order the SP to erect a structure for highway use without consent of the railroad. The complaint says law limits the commissioner to "permitting" an overhead structure to be built across a railroad track.

\$60,000 Blaze At Prison

SALEM, Oct. 26 (AP)—Fire destroyed a state prison annex farm barn last night. Loss from the structure, hay and machinery was estimated at \$60,000.

Deputy Warden Eugene Hailey said some of the convicts helped Salem city firemen fight the blaze and prevent damage to nearby cow barns and implement sheds.

Flames were discovered by Hailey as he left the prison annex for the penitentiary about 7 p. m.
