Yaqui Kid, Al Szasz Win Mat Matches

The Yaqui Kid scored a victory over Jack Lipscomb last night at the armory—and his manager and trainer, Yaqui Joe, was given an assist the hard way.

With both grapplers holding one fall apiece, Lipscomb, one of the meanest wrestlers in the business, went to work on Al Szasz in the corner with a methodical chop to the whiskers.

While this was going on, the Kid slipped up behind and slapped the painful grapevine on Lipscomb. It brought a quick "uncle" from the Lip.

Lipscomb spent most of the match belting Yaqui Kid. The Sonora, Mexico, lad retaliated with well-placed kicks to the ribs. Lipscomb grabbed the first fall in 9 minutes, 18 seconds with a Boston Crab after he had broken the Indian death lock by yanking the Mexican boy's hair.

The Kid took the second with the grapevine in 7:17 and the third came in 8:50.

The best fight of the evening went to Al Szasz, who last Saturday won the northwest junior heavyweight title from Tony Ross in Roseburg.

Szasz' victim was popular Buck Davidson. It was a fast, rugged match with the crowd divided as to their favorite. The first fall went to Davidson with a surfboard after Bouncing Szasz missed a well-intended dropkick. The time was 9:58.

Szasz punished Buck with a short arm schorsa in the second canto and softened Davidson for the second fall. Szasz evened matters in 10 minutes, 12 seconds with a reverse headlock.

Buck angered Al in the third fall when he booted Szasz in the tummy during a scuffle next to the ropes. Both employed drop kicks in quick succession and both missed.

After Buck had missed his target—Szasz' chin—the Bouncing Boy picked up Buck and dumped him unceremoniously on the mat with two thudding body slams. It took 12 minutes, 27 seconds for the third and deciding fall.

Undeclared, United California

figures as the favorite. The Bears have done everything asked. UCLA also is unbeaten in the Coast conference, but dropped a 14-0 game to Santa Clara. In contrast, California started its schedule by dumping Santa Clara, 21-7.

California, therefore, is the choice here by a couple of touchdowns. The

Los Angeles setting gives UCLA whatever advantage there is in playing at home.

The fast Stanford team backs up against the Giant killer, Santa Clara. It is a non-league contest, but important to Stanford which still has Rose Bowl hopes. Coach Marchie Schwartz' Stanford cannot afford

to get knocked over again, either in or out of the conference. The crystal ball mirrors a loss for Santa Clara.

Southern California takes on Washington at Seattle and Washington State travels to Oregon State's home field in conference encounter.

Once beaten USC rates the nod over a Washington squad that has lost five in a row. Washington State should outscore OSC in a close one.

Idaho looks the better in its game with Portland, Montana, after dropping three straight, may break into the win column again over Montana State.

Oregon followers hope for a win over Iowa, but the outlook is not bright, particularly in view of the Big Ten team's recent upsurge and the fact the contest will be played at Iowa City.

Ousted A's Coach Won't Blame Mack

MOT SPRINGS, Ark., Oct. 27 (AP)—Al Simmons says there are two reasons for his dismissal as a Philadelphia Athletics coach.

First, says Simmons—a member of Connie Mack's championship teams of 1929-30-31—a "goat or goats had to be found" after the club finished two notches below the expected third place in the final American league standings.

Second, Simmons says he and Assistant Manager Earle Mack "never got along."

"When I thought certain things should be done for the good of the club I told Mr. Mack whether or not Earle agreed," Simmons explained.

In what he termed his final statement concerning his dismissal, Simmons said yesterday he "disliked" continuing the discussion but felt that he "should reply to charges" made by another of Mack's sons, Connie Mack Jr.

When the Athletics board of directors fired Simmons and Coach Earle Mack early this month, Connie Mack Jr., accused Simmons of not doing a good job and not taking a real interest in the ball club. Simmons

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Dick Dunkel's COLLEGE FOOTBALL POWER INDEX

EXPLANATION—The Power Index provides a direct comparison of the relative strength of any two teams for this season to date. Thus, a 50.0 team has been 10 scoring points stronger than a 40.0 team on their comparative records, in which scoring margin has been weighted against strength of opposition. This does not necessarily mean that a 50.0 team should defeat a 40.0 team by exactly 10 points in the future. Teams rarely follow past performance that closely. The Dunkel system correlates records of all college teams and was started in 1929.
