

Model, Art Student Revealed as Valued FBI Wartime Agent

NEW YORK (NEA) — Early one February morning in 1942, a couple of strangers rang the doorbell of Angela Calomiris' apartment in Greenwich Village. They identified themselves as FBI agents.

Up to that point in life the photographer and art student knew nothing about communism. But the FBI men, as she put it today, "seemed to know a heck of a lot about me."

"Several hours later I was aghast, and a little bit honored, when they said they had a war job for me, to serve as a plant in the communist party. They made it clear there would be no recognition or compensation."

"And if I landed in jail, it would be, 'Too bad, kid. We don't know you.'"

Party Card

By April Angela had a party card, and seven years afterward, last April 27, to the amazement of her friends and the comrades alike, she turned up as the FBI's star undercover girl at the communist conspiracy trial. Her six days of sensational testimony helped materially to convict the defendants.

That sizable chunk out of her 33 years of life has cost Angela Calomiris plenty. In fact, it left her broke.

A month before testifying, she closed her studio and discontinued all photographic assignments from such clients as top national magazines, U. S. Steel and advertising agencies. She borrowed money from friends and sold her 1942 Pontiac. Today, more than five months after appearing for the government, she's still looking for a job.

Annoyances

There have been a few minor annoyances, too, which Angela, a witty, intelligent girl, slight of build, weighing 100 pounds, takes lightly. One neighbor called her a "dirty rat." Another slammed a gate in her face.

Most of the neighbors and all the tradespeople have been friendly. One building superintendent warned: "Angie, be careful, a lot of party people live on this street."

And a family across the street

watches her apartment through binoculars.

The real war of nerves, she says, began last October. That's when the FBI asked her to testify against the communist bosses.

"Between running around like mad on party business and chasing down to the U. S. Court House, it kept me on edge."

"I always faced the danger of being spotted going into the court house by some comrade. I met that by wearing dark glasses and borrowing strange clothes."

Once a comrade asked Angela to help the party investigate prospective jurors in the case.

Then, three days before she took the stand, a communist official whom she'd never met told her the party wanted her to work as a courier, since the movement probably would be going underground. She calls it "an espionage drop."

Too Useful

From a counter-espionage standpoint, such an assignment would have been invaluable. But the government decided she'd be too useful as a witness.

The night before she took the stand, Angela attended her last class at the party's Jefferson school. There she heard the standard communist epithet, "stoolpigeon," flung at Herbert A. Philbrick, the FBI's crack undercover man who had already given his testimony.

That didn't faze her then. Nor does the party's calumny bother her now. But her first night after testifying, Angela says she tossed sleeplessly in the hotel room supplied by the government. After that, she was assigned a 24-hour policewoman bodyguard.

Rid of both the communist party and her FBI work, Angela's grateful that nobody has called her a Mata Hari.

Reluctant

She's finished with free-lancing photography for the present. "I'm reticent about opening doors and not knowing who's on the other side," she explains.

"I'd like to bury myself in a staff job with a national magazine or an industrial corporation and start

over on a businesslike basis, now that I'm a free soul again.

"I'm proud of what I did and I don't feel I've made a sacrifice," she says, "although my career has been hurt. But, now that I'm trying to make up for those seven years, I'm in trouble."

Angela never did find out why the FBI sought her out that February morning seven years ago. She suspects the contact may have been established through another FBI plant who, she states with satisfaction, "is still operating in the communist party in an important post."
