

Stocks Reach Year's High

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—Heavy buying drove the stock market to a new 1949 high today.

Gains ranged from fractions to more than a point in one of the business sessions of the year.

A surge of demand at the opening gave the market a start. Prices advanced for a couple of hours until noon after midday when fresh buying power appeared.

Some steel and railroad stocks, which had been fairly early, joined the parade.

Turnover hit a rate of around 1,800,000 shares for the full day.

The rise got under way late yesterday, largely because of a revival of hopes for quick settlement of the steel and coal strikes.

Higher prices were paid for U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Goodrich Tire, Montgomery Ward, American Telephone, Ken-

NEW DELHI, India, Oct. 27 (AP)—The home ministry announced today that N. V. Godse and Narayan Apte will be hanged November 15 for the assassination of Mahatma Gandhi in January, 1948.

Godse, who shot Gandhi, and Apte were convicted of the assassination conspiracy and sentenced to death last February by a special court in Delhi's Red fort.
