

# Yearly Auto Output Record Broken; Car Jam Mean Headache

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—The auto industry yesterday broke another record and added a little more to one of the nation's problems—traffic. Yesterday the 3,256,421st vehicle of the year rolled off the production line. This tops, two months ahead of time, the output record for any one full year, standing since 1929. About 4 1/2 million of these vehicles have been passenger cars.

The new one yesterday joined the 32,787,100 others which R. L. Polk and company, auto statisticians, report were registered in the country as of two weeks ago.

**Tough Going**  
If you don't think there are that many on the streets and highways, just try taking your family out for an auto ride in or near any big city on the next sunny Sunday. Or try to park in almost any city business district.

Traffic jams are now so much a part of our lives that one of the services radio stations offer their metropolitan listeners is a periodic report on just where traffic conditions are worse during holiday rushes.

This is unlikely to endanger in any way the sales chances of the new record car. But it is a headache to a lot of people besides traffic officers; to city merchants, to the oil industry, to the railroads, to city planners, and to city dwellers and suburbanites alike.

**Parking**  
In some cities parking is not permitted in the districts where most of the biggest department stores cluster. In others parking is a time-wasting puzzle. Department stores try to solve this by building branches in the suburbs where many of their customers live and, more and more, shop.

The oil industry is selling more gasoline every year, but some of its leaders worry because traffic snarls increasingly tend to take the pleasure out of pleasure driving. Many cars that could be using gasoline are in garages because city driving is increasingly unpleasant, and because getting out into the country over the week-end means a bumper-to-bumper strain on the driver's nerves.

**Country Kicks**  
The country folk don't like it either. Hordes of city Sunday drivers lead many a suburb to try to close its parks and beaches to any outside cars. And many a country resident gripes because it is no longer much pleasure to take his family for their usual evening or Sunday afternoon drive—their roads are crowded with city folk he regards as intruders.

Railroads worry because more and more intercity hauling is being done by private automobiles, and less by train. The roads rail at the trucks for using tax-built highways, but there isn't much the iron horse boys can say against the family car toting the folks on their trips. There are too many car owners for that, and most railmen own and drive cars themselves.

**Ideas**  
Some railroads talk about giving up and curtailing their own expensive passenger service. Others consider offering attractive rates for shipping cars on trains, so that you will have the family bus for pleasure at the end of long trips. And still others already are arranging for rail passengers to get drive-yourself cars at the end of the train trip.

Highway engineers offer varied and intricate schemes for solving the traffic problem—most of them expensive. City planners see the growing number of cars almost as a Frankenstein's monster. Some are tearing up and widening chief arteries. Others plan huge and expensive city parking garages.

**San Francisco**  
San Francisco a few years ago tore up a city park, built a large garage under it, and put the grass and trees and park benches back on the roof. New York has some elevated through streets, talks of more, and builds vehicle tunnels under its waterways.

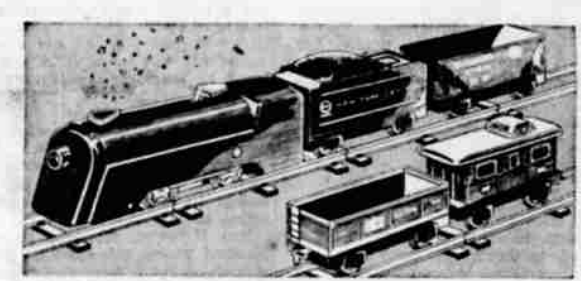

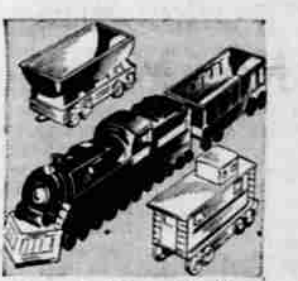

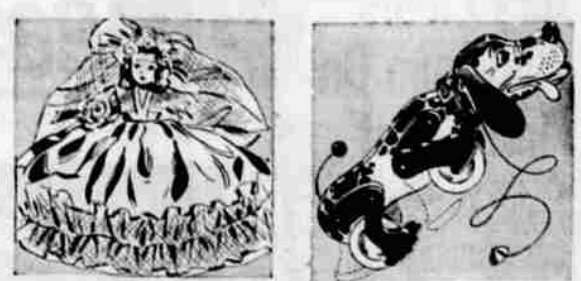
