COMMUNISM AND RELIGION

KLAMATH FALLS, ORE. (To the Editor)—Sentence one, Article One in the Bill of Rights of the Constitution reads as follows: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." What does this mean exactly? Just study for a minute these figures on the present size and nature of religion and its works in the U. S. A.; 266 denominations, 253,000 churches and synagogues, 71,900,000 members, 162,000 Sunday schools, 15,000 parochial schools, 600 colleges and schools of higher learning, libraries, radio stations, publishing houses for books, magazines, newspapers, charities, orphanages, hospitals, missionary forces, ladies aids, auxiliaries, men's societies, young groups and others. These are what Communism would like to take over and destroy.

Earl Browder, former head of the Communists in the U. S. said, "We Communists do not distinguish between good and bad religion, because we think they are all bad." Faith as we know it, is the sort of thing you find in the Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. The Communist faith or "Marxism-Leninism," as operated by Joe Stalin is a plan and method to rule the world. The man who drew up the plan was Karl Marx, who lived from 1818 to 1883. The man who put the plan into action in real life was Vladimir I. Ulyanov, alias: Nikolai Lenin, who lived from 1870 to 1924, and led the world Communists to capture Russia in 1917-18. The man who made the plan a word force was Josef Vlasovnaovich Djugashvili, alias: Josef Stalin, now living, and 69 years old, who followed Lenin in command of the world Communist conspiracy. Remember the present "Stalin" started out in life to destroy the government of his own country, and rebuilt it on Communist lines through bloody revolution and that is how it was actually done. He was against all law except Communist ideas as laid down by Karl Marx. He used the alias "Stalin" to hide his real identity, just as Ulyanov used "Lenin."

Marx' idea of a Communist world was that the world as we know it must be destroyed — religion, family, laws, rights, everything. Anybody opposing was to be destroyed too. Marx wanted a world in which people owned no property, took orders from the government without question, and let their family life, education, wives, parents, and children — be without religion, morals or ideals as we know them. Marx' idea of morality and family were that anything is moral — even lying, stealing, and murder — if it brings on Communism. That woman should have children for the Communist state to educate, train, and use, but parents should not have any in training according to their own ideas. That there is no need to fear God because He does not exist. Marx had the idea that people could never be happy, have enough to eat, make enough money, or have success in the kind of world we know. Our own U. S. A. is living proof that he was as wrong as a man can be.

Perhaps Marx was crazy, but he was not the first evil and crazy man to start the terrible world upheaval, nor was he the last. Hitler was like that too, but look at what he did. Some overlook Marx' craziness because he was one of the most effective propagandists who ever lived. His preaching of destruction appealed especially to people who wanted to rule others and did not know how. It still does.

Lenin was the son of a minor government clerk. He had a terrible thirst for power. Early in his life, he read Marx, caught the idea of forming Communist cells of revolution as Marx planned them, and built a conspiracy to capture his country.

When Russia's Czarist Government crashed in the war of 1914-18, it was followed by a Republic organized along the lines of our own. But before the Republic could really take hold, Lenin's Communists came out from under cover, slaughtered all opposition and set up by force of arms, a Communist dictatorship. They still have it today.

I would like to comment briefly on the recent sentencing of ten top ranking American Communist leaders, particularly Robert Thompson. Less than five years ago, this same Thompson wore the uniform of an American soldier. He was awarded our nation's second highest military decoration — the Distinguished Service Cross, for service in the Pacific. Today he is in prison for voting to destroy by force, these, our own United States.

I wonder what those Army Courts — Martial boards are thinking — more than a hundred G. I.'s were executed during World War II, many for less severe offenses. I would venture to say had Thompson's fellow officers and the men in his organization known then what they know now, Thompson would never have set foot again on the soil of our glorious Republic. Too bad we don't have a law whereby people like Thompson could be

placed before a firing squad. There are many thousands of Americans who would offer their services free of charge in helping execute those traitors.

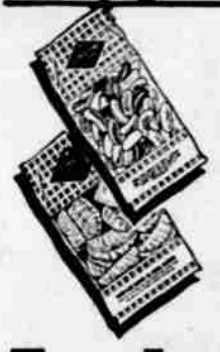
