According to Dr. Fredricks, 18 per cent of pre-school children failed their eye test, 40 per cent of the third grade children failed, and 82 per cent of the eighth grade children failed. Sheds Nearing Completion

Two new maintenance buildings in the Northern section of Klamath county are rapidly being completed, one to be ready for use this coming week.

The new Chiloquin maintenance shop and storage shed is getting its finishing touches this week, and will soon be occupied by state highway equipment and crews getting ready for winter work ahead. Burkhardt and Schortgen of Klamath Falls hold the contract on this job for \$13,376.63.

Underway at Fort Klamath, is the state highway shed burned last winter during the season's coldest weather, is the second shop and maintenance shed. Construction is of pumice blocks, as is the Chiloquin set-up, and City Electric Inc., Salem, holds the contract for \$12,783.60.

Work of framing the roof is underway this week and equipment will be able to go into the shed before the heavy winter sets in, state highway officials advised.

Fires, Drought Hurt Coffee

SAO PAULO. (AP)—Forest fires and a long drought are ruining next year's coffee crop, Silvio Pacheco, of the farmers' association, reported after a tour of the interior areas of Sao Paulo. There are forest fires almost everywhere, he said, and the continued heat has killed flowering coffee plants.

He said it has not rained in two months. If by next month it does not rain, farmers told him, prospects for next year's crop will be none. Sao Paulo is the greatest coffee producer in Brazil. A reported crop of seven and half million bags has been estimated now at only five.

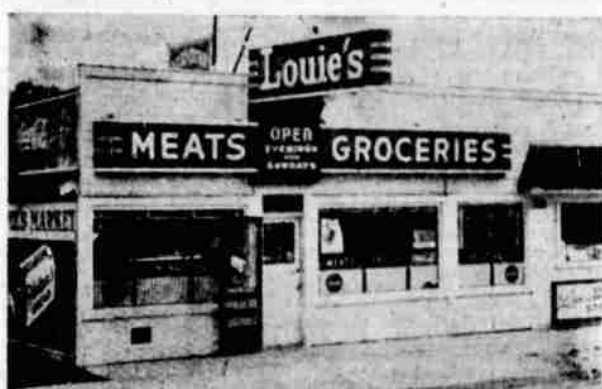
