

College Gets Famed Bell From Church

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—the original bell that hung in the belfry of old Corvallis college to call students to classes, weekdays and worshippers to service on Sundays, has been given to Oregon State college by officials of the former South Methodist church, now merged with the First Methodist church of Corvallis.

The old bell, cast in England in 1660, was brought around the Horn and placed in the college belfry in the early thirties. It served throughout the life of the college until the campus was moved to its present site, and then continued as the bell for the church until the latest building was sold to the government for USO purposes in 1942.

The bell was presented at a convocation addressed by Governor McKeey, October 19. Students have arranged to use the old bell as a "victory bell" on special occasions, mounted on a trailer. At other times it will be kept in the college museum.

Rationless Meals For Czechs

PHRAGUE (AP)—For the first time in ten years Czechs can walk into some restaurants these days, order a steak and a bottle of Pilsner beer and walk out without plunking down ration coupons. But only a few Czechs can take advantage of this new freedom because "off ration meals" usually cost from 50 to 100 per cent more than those paid for with the little blue stamps.

The price for a rationless meal, including soup, beer, a meat course and dessert, is a minimum of 100 crowns (\$2). Few Czechs can afford such prices more than once a week.
