

RED-HOT PELICANS SHATTER G.P.

Huck Dashes For Three Scores In Top League Tilt

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 29 (Special)—Sharp, slashing blocking hewed the way for Gaynor Huck last night and the elusive scabbard scooted to three of the Pelicans' six touchdowns to fashion a 39 to 21 victory over the Grants Pass Cavemen.

The win moved Klamath Falls a notch nearer the state play-offs with only Bend to get over in league competition.

The Cavemen found the veteran Pelican line too stiff and had to take to the air for two of their three touchdowns.

The Pelicans stunned the huge crowd when they scored on the first series of plays following the opening kickoff.

Starting on its own 43 yard line after receiving the kickoff the Pelicans exploded for a touchdown in five plays. Joe Demetras ripped advanced the ball to the 30 on an end-around. Demetras crashed to the 28 and from there Carlson skirted end, going over standing up.

The Pelicans scored twice more in the first half to run up a 20 to 7 halftime score.

The Washington Redskins' owner also made it plain that he is prepared to veto any more to include five of the AOC's teams—Buffalo, Los Angeles, Baltimore, New York and Chicago—in the older circuit.

"Under certain conditions," he said, he might favor inclusion of the Cleveland Browns and the San Francisco Forty-niners.

Under National League rules, any move to increase the National League above its present size of 10 teams takes the unanimous consent of all the owners.

Pirates Reach Playoff

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—Klamath Falls and Marshfield virtually captured district football titles last night as the Grants Pass defending state champions lost their chance for a repeat crown.

The tumultuous Rocky, former ruler of the division and a great drawing card, would seem to have the inside track over other leading contenders—Welterweight Champion Ray (Sugar) Robinson and France's Laurent Daubuille.

All three hold claims to a crack at Lamotta's crown.

However, Laurent is not known here and probably would have to show himself a time or two before getting a big New York shot at the man he beat in Canada.

Cerdan's death removed the No. 1 challenger for the crown.

The stocky, smiling Frenchman, acclaimed the best and most popular French athlete since pre-war days, had won the title from Tony Zale in September of 1948, but lost it to Lamotta last June in Detroit.

Cerdan, his manager, Jo Longman, and Trainer Paul Jensen were among 48 persons killed yesterday when a Paris-to-New York plane crashed into an Azores mountain peak. They were en route here for the scheduled return title bout with Lamotta at Madison Square Garden December 2.

Officials of the International Boxing club were too stunned last night over Cerdan's death to do any planning for the December 2 date. They said it would be several days before anything is done about a fight to replace the ill-fated Lamotta-Cerdan bout.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Oct. 29 (AP)—Seven Joliet (Ill.) high school football players, including six first stringers, were in jail today on charges of looting two stores of clothing while on their way to last night's game.

Four of the players missed their team's game against nearby Freeport and the other three were seized by police after the contest, which ended in a 6-6 tie.

Police said larceny charges were placed against six of the youths and the seventh was charged with accessory after the fact. They said the youths admitted they had looted the two stores of clothing during a 45-minute stopover on the 100-mile bus ride from Joliet to Freeport.

CAPOT WRAPS UP BANGTAIL HONOR

BALTIMORE, Oct. 29 (AP)—Capot just about had "horse of the year" honors wrapped up for Greentree stable today, wrestling them from Calumet farm in one stunning race.

Capot forged ahead as the 1949 champion of the turf by beating the horse with the most formidable record of the year, Coaltown, in yesterday's Pimlico special.

It may be that he beat a horse which became lame sometime during the mile and three-sixteenths race.

Trainer Jimmy Jones and other horsemen who gathered around to watch Coaltown during his cooling-out period noticed the Calumet star favored his right hind leg.

"We'll be able to tell more about his trouble tomorrow," Jones said dismally. "I wouldn't be surprised to find him a lot worse then."

The way Capot won—by a smashing 12 lengths—came like a bolt out of the overcast sky.

The special evidently ended the year's contention for division honors, as "horse of the year" and best 3-year-old colt. Capot figured to take both, the latter from Calumet's Ponder.

Trainer John Gaver sees no other 1949 races in sight for Capot and he soon will head for Aiken, S. C., for the winter. Calumet already has taken Ponder out of training, after agreeing to keep him out of the special so Capot could start, and the same letdown is coming to Coal-town.

Jones conceded the stable had done well this year, winning \$1,124,642.

Greentree took the whole \$15,000 special pot and Capot nibbled on the floral wreath in the winner's circle. Capot's backers got \$5 for 2. Coal-town went off the 3 to 10 favorite.

Saddler Demands

NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—Prospects of a third chapter in the thrilling series featuring Featherweight Champion Willie Pep and Challenger Sandy Saddler are a little brighter today.

Reason for the renewal of hope for this fight "natural" is a changed outlook by Saddler's manager, Charley Johnston. Johnston indicated that he would be willing to lower his asking price in order to get elusive Willie in with his "tiger" again.

"We'll fight him right here in the dressing room if he'll (Pep) put his title on the line against Sandy," Johnston said last night.

Johnston made the statement right after Saddler had demolished Paddy De Marco, a rugged Brooklyn lightweight, in nine rounds in Madison Square Garden.

Saddler projected himself into the limelight by his knockout victory in four rounds over Pep in the Garden a year ago today. Pep regained his crown by outpointing Saddler in a sensational 15-rounder in the Garden last February 11.

Meyers Rides To Saddle Triumph
