# 'Cello-Piano Duo Delightful Concert

The 1949-50 series of the Klamath Community Concert got off to as fine a start as its well wishers could hope for Thursday night when Nikolai and Joanna Graudan presented a delightful concert as the cello and piano duo of well deserved acclaim.

A packed house greeted the two artists who were particularly generous with their encores. Each of the four encores was familiar and greeted by a round of applause. At the close of Joanna Graudan's piano solos, she played the delightful "Maid With the Flaxen Hair" by de Bussy, and Chopin's lovely "Waltz." The full two-hour concert was brought to a thrilling finale with Nikolai and Joanna Graudan playing as a duo, "The Swan" by Saint-Saens, and the always popular "Flight of the Bumble Bee" by Rimsky-Korsakoff.

Both artists achieved instant recognition as soloists, but something should be said—an artistic plug perhaps—on the delightful and delicate accompaniment of Joanna Graudan when her husband held the stage with such masterful cello playing as has seldom been heard here. The pianist used the seldom-seen combination in a feminine artist, the understanding and lightness of a woman's interpretation coupled with superb strength and accuracy which definitely was not sacrificed from the standpoint of the technical performer.

The young fry, who will be concert supporters in a few years, were given a royal welcome behind stage when the last number drifted away. Graudan even offered his cello for a try-out to any youngster interested in playing that marvelous instrument. There were no takers, but it was a generous gesture. (L.B.)
