

Lakeview Minister Threatened

LAKEVIEW—A highly respected Lakeview minister who has been the object of threatening letters since the first of January, advised authorities here that his church had been entered Saturday morning and all but one of the letters stolen.

The minister, Rev. Omer Isdo of the Lakeview Methodist church, said he had received six letters since early in the year, the last apparently slipped under the church door late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning. This letter he had on his person, the others bound with a rubber band in a pigeon hole of his desk in the church.

One letter advised "for men like you we need the KKK." Another threatened to "expose" Rev. Isdo if he did not leave town. The principal complaint was that Rev. Isdo was too active in civic affairs.

The pastor came to Lakeview 18 months ago from Montana. During World War II he served as chaplain with the 4th army at Fort Lewis, holding the rank of major.

Investigating police said the double doors to the church were forced and also the study door which was locked. The desk was ransacked but only articles missing were the five letters.

4 Bills Await Truman Signing

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—President Truman cleared his desk today of all but four bills sent to him by the first session of the 81st congress.

The deadline for action on the remaining bills, including the farm bill, is midnight tomorrow, the White House said.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said he did not know whether Truman would act today on the long-range agriculture bill. It would permit the government to support the prices of most farm crops at or near wartime levels.

Air Collision Kills 4 Fliers

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 31 (AP)—Four fliers from Randolph air force base were killed today in a spectacular midair collision.

Their charred bodies, burned beyond recognition, were taken from the hulls of two training planes.

The planes crashed to the ground on the J. H. Harper farm, seven miles southeast of Sayers. The scene is about 10 miles southeast of Randolph field.

Early Halloween Vandalism Noted

Three instances of pre-Halloween vandalism bringing property damage were reported to city police last night.

Electrical plugs were thrown through two residential windows, at the John C. O'Neill home, 1901 Auburn, and the J. K. Van Hook home, 1300 Martin, and at 2320 Orchard a clothesline was snipped and the clothing scattered over the yard.

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Logger Milo Hudson Killed Near Lakeview

LAKEVIEW—Milo Oscar Hudson, 40, was killed instantly Sunday at mid-morning while working as a choke setter for Truman Lawson, logging contractor for the Lakeview Logging company 11 miles northwest of here and two miles south of Bear Flat.

Hudson was probably struck by a limb or a flying chain, but there were no witnesses to the actual injury which caused his death.

According to Lawson, the crew was snaking logs out of a steep area with a cat and Marion Lawson, brother of Truman Lawson, saw Hudson standing in the road. Marion said he went on working down a bank and some 100 yards beyond and when he looked back saw Hudson "fold up."

The brothers ran to Hudson and started to bring him to town but observed he was dead and advised Sheriff Tom Elliott, Coroner Everett Osterman and District Attorney Bob Welch.

An autopsy was held Monday morning and death was attributed to "collapse and hemorrhage of the lungs and only a heavy, crushing object could have caused the death."

Hudson came to Lakeview several months ago from Canby, Calif. His only known relatives are in Vermont.

Lakeview Boy Shot in Duck Hunt Accident

LAKEVIEW—A 15-year-old Lakeview high school student, Jerry Hugh O'Leary, is in a serious condition at Lakeview General hospital as the result of a gunshot wound suffered during a duck hunt Sunday afternoon.

Jerry is suffering from shock and possible nerve damage but he is not thought seriously injured. The attending physician said he counted 32 pellets in the X-ray of the youth's pelvic cavity.

Hidden

The youth, accompanied by Charles Hamilton Jr., 18; Jimmy Bevel, 17, and R. V. Johnson, 15, had left Lakeview early in the afternoon to hunt on the Jack Mulkey ranch, five miles west of Lakeview. They had hidden in the grass, waiting for the geese to come in, when Hamilton threw a shell into the chamber of his 12-gauge Winchester automatic.

The shell exploded, the shot coming out the barrel and striking Jerry in the left thigh.

Mulkey brought the injured youth into Lakeview along with his companions. Young Hamilton may have an eye injury and also has facial powder burns from the blast. Jimmy Bevel received face burns but Johnson was uninjured.

Young Ranch Worker Dies In Car Wreck

TULELAKE—A 23-year-old ranch worker and prominent family member, Richard E. Domen, is dead, victim of a late Saturday night automobile wreck.

Investigating authorities said the tragedy occurred when young Domen's car overturned in a canal at a sharp curve some two and one-half miles east of Tulelake.

Domen worked and lived with his rancher brother, Steve Domen of the Winema district and was returning home alone after a late Tulelake movie when the accident occurred.

Domen's small coupe left the road on the curve and unended in the water-filled ditch, imprisoning him beneath about 18 inches of water. However, Deputy Coroner Jack Stark of Alturas, one of the investigating officers, said he believed Domen was killed outright and did not drown.

A passing motorist, John Baley, discovered the wreck about one o'clock Sunday morning and notified Tulelake officers.

Domen's body was found when the car was pulled from the ditch shortly after the alarm. The body was moved to Alturas.

Young Domen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Domen Sr., East Patterson, N. J., had been with his brother on the ranch for about a year.

Other relatives in this area include an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. John Takacs, and four cousins, Mrs. John Kandra Jr., Mrs. Robert Nebiker, Steve and Richard Takacs.

The body is to be returned to New Jersey for funeral and burial.

Thief Switches Cars, Loses

A car thief passing through Klamath Falls made a quick switch over the week-end, but didn't take his second vehicle far.

A 1948 Dodge pickup, property of William O. Weaver, of Wolf Creek, was stolen from Wolf Creek Saturday night. Early yesterday morning it was found out of gas and abandoned near the M. L. Luttrell place near Keno.

But Luttrell's car, a 1940 Studebaker sedan, was missing.

It was located this morning abandoned on highway 97 not far from Pelican City. How the thief traveled from there is still a mystery. He hasn't been apprehended.

Robbers Take Nearly \$2000

ROSEBURG, Oct. 31 (AP)—Safe-crackers removed nearly \$2000 in currency and silver from the safe at Nielsen's market, south of Roseburg, last night, Sheriff O. T. Carter reported today.

Carter said entry to the store, Roseburg's largest food market, was made by prying off a portion of the roof. He added it looked like a "professional" job.

CIO Red Purge Promised By Phil Murray

CLEVELAND, Oct. 31 (AP)—CIO President Philip Murray touched off a rousing demonstration at the opening session of the 11th convention today when he promised to "cleanse" the organization of pro communists.

After referring to abuse directed at him by the Moscow radio Murray, in his keynote address, said that at meetings of his own CIO executive board:

"I did not know whether I was talking to a fink (strikebreaker), a commie, or an FBI man."

Outburst

"If we are going to cleanse this movement, which by the way, we are going to do at this convention," Murray started to say when the more than 600 delegates broke into the noisy cheers.

Murray was unable to finish his sentence.

At least three, and possibly a dozen union under-so-called left-wing leadership are threatened with ouster from the CIO.

The convention opened with the CIO turn wide open by the worst factional war in its history.

Canby Man Found Dead in Bed

CANBY—John W. Demuth, 42-year-old ex-bartender for the White Cabin tavern, was found dead in his bed Saturday night by the tavern night watchman.

Demuth had been laid off at the White Cabin and recently has been working with a construction crew.

Death was attributed to natural causes but an autopsy was held in Alturas Monday and an investigation is being made.

Demuth has lived here for several years. The body is being shipped to Los Angeles for burial.

U.S. Industry Profits Increase in 3rd Quarter

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Profits of American industry turned upwards in the third quarter of this year for the first time in 12 months.

They stand only slightly below the all-time high mark of a year ago, when third quarter earnings were the peak in the record year of 1948.

Unusual

An unusual feature of the third quarter was the substantial increase in earnings of automobile companies, which off-set a sharp decline in oil company profits.

The compilation by the Associated Press of earnings reports of 314 leading corporations in 11 major fields showed today a total net profit of \$1,003,644,061 in the July-September quarter.

That is 4.3 per cent higher than the total of \$952,102,819 reported by the same corporations in the second quarter of this year.

It is only 4.1 per cent lower than the \$1,046,983,291 earned by these companies in the third quarter of 1948.

Lower

Corporate earnings slid lower in the final quarter of 1948 from their third quarter peak, and the decline continued in the first and second quarters of this year.

The upturn was not surprising to those who watched the recession of early 1949 give way gradually to an economic recovery around mid-year. The present profit trend confirms that rebound.

Largely responsible for the overall good showing are the earnings of two automobile companies.

Chrysler and General Motors increased their earnings by more than \$98,000,000 in the third quarter of this year over a year ago, while the earnings of 22 oil companies fell nearly \$97,000,000 below the level of the third quarter of 1948.

Comparison

A comparison of the third quarter of this year with the previous quarter shows the two motormakers added more than \$41,000,000 to their earnings, while the oil companies fell back by some \$13,000,000.

Out of the 24 principal groups of companies, only seven showed increases in earnings in the third quarter over a year ago, but 14 of them increased their earnings in the
