Some of the peasant ladies still go with their faces covered except for their eyes.

The Boyd family was fortunate in finding a house which has a two burner gas stove with an oven. Very few homes there have ovens or any

builtin cupboards or hot water in the kitchens.

Food is very hard to obtain in Turkey. Bread is made of all dark flour. The wheat crop was very short this year so white flour was taken off the market.

Vegetables were abundant and of good quality this summer.

The boys enjoy reading The Herald and News although it is six weeks old when they receive it.

Juliette Gordon Low

Memory of a Heroic Woman Honored in Girl Scout Week

The story of Girl Scout Week is the story of one woman who at the age of 52, in poor health, and almost stone deaf built an idea into a nation-wide organization that has touched countless thousands of girls and this year is reaching over a million and a half young women.

Juliette Gordon Low was the founder of Girl Scouting in the United States, and Girl Scout Week is the week that includes her birthday, October 31. This year the dates are from October 30 to November 5, and the 719 Girl Scouts in Klamath Falls join their sister Scouts in honoring her memory.

Mrs. Low was born in Savannah, Georgia, in 1860, and was the belle of her time, being beautiful and talented and popular. She traveled much, mostly to England, where she met and married William Low. Her life then became a gay social whirl. She was mistress of three houses, including a castle, was present at court and earned the reputation of being a famous hostess.

Her husband died in 1905 and shortly thereafter, Daisy, as she had been nicknamed, met Lord Baden-Powell in England, the founder of Boy Scouting. He inspired and helped her organize her first troop of Girl Guides in a lonely little Scottish village. She had seven girls whom she taught spinning, weaving and poultry raising to help support their families.

Once Mrs. Low set her energies to this cause, it grew and prospered. She had another nickname handed down from a great-grandmother which suited her to a T. It was "Little Ship Under Full Sail" which was what she was! In 1912, right after she returned to the United States to live, she organized her first troop, and in 1913 the first summer camp was held. In only two more years there were 5000 Girl Scouts, plus a national council and a constitution and a charter.

She donated all her personal funds, which were only moderate, to start her idea, and at one point sold family heirlooms including valuable pearls.

In her memory the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund was founded, to which Girl Scouts all over the nation contribute their pennies, nickels and dimes. In Klamath Falls a special ceremony is held in each troop when each girl is to contribute pennies equal to her age.

The national total for 1948 reached the figure of \$89,000.

Many and varied are the uses to which this money is put. There is one project that brings women from other countries here and sends our leaders abroad to exchange ideas.

Another is that outstanding Girl Scout from 16 countries gather at a beautiful Girl Scout chalet in Switzerland annually for three weeks. Navejo Girl Scouts were sent to camps, CARE parcels were sent overseas, Girl Scout uniforms were sent to Poland. A jeep was bought for Greek Girl Scouts and help was sent to a Chinese school.

A large fund was given to the United Nations fund for needy children, and what was left went into operating expenses for the World Association of Girl Scouts.

The World Friendship Fund is a fitting tribute to Juliette Gordon Low, who overcame many personal obstacles to found an organization which brings girls of many nations closer together.

Flegel Sees Raver As CVA Boss

ROSEBURG, Nov. 1 (AP)—State Senator Austin P. Flegel, Portland, told a democratic party audience here last night that Dr. Paul Raver of Bonneville Power administration is the type of man who would be named to administer a CVA.

Flegel said Raver is an "honest, high class government official" and the type that would introduce business methods to Columbia basin development. He said the work now being done by 33 government agencies.

The Portland legislator spoke earlier to a chamber of commerce luncheon group on the proposed Columbia valley administration bill and its aims.
