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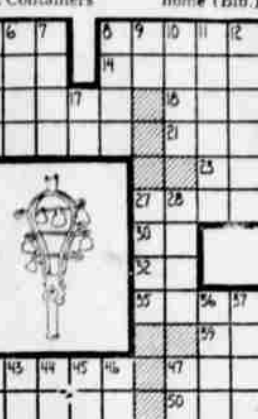

when the lodge was completely destroyed by fire and Mrs. Rosol lost all her furniture, personal belongings and clothing of her two children and herself. In this connection, correction should be made of the account of the fire appearing in Saturday's paper, for the sake of the record. The message was telephoned in on Saturday morning, and when it appeared in print, was found to be erroneous in at least two details.

First, Mrs. Rosol was not home at the time the fire broke out, but had gone with friends to the schoolhouse here to bring home her two children who had been attending the Halloween party for the school pupils that night. No one was home at the lodge, which was in flames when Mrs. Rosol and children returned home. Also, Mr. and Mrs. William Boal have not owned the property for a year as stated, having acquired it only this past August. At one time, Henry Grimes of the Klamath Falls was the owner of the land and rustic log structure which went up in flames Friday night. It is understood that Mr. and Mrs. Boal carried partial insurance on the house, and that Mrs. Rosol's furniture was fully insured, which will help to some extent in the loss sustained as a result of the fire.

An interesting little sidelight is the fact that Mrs. Rosol's car was parked close to the burning building, with no key in it, and the machine was pushed out of the danger zone by people arriving at the fire, and who stated that the body of the car was nearly too hot to hold their hands against, and it would in all probability have been added to the loss by fire but for their quick work.

Another disastrous fire occurred the same evening, when the ranch house of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Hunsaker at the Hunsaker ranch on upper Klamath marsh was completely destroyed by fire of undetermined origin which broke out when no one was home, burning the house to the ground with all its contents of furniture and personal belongings. Mr. and Mrs. Hunsaker spent the week-

end here at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred B. Castel Jr. and daughter Lana.

Life is just one continual round of pleasure for local sportmen, at least for those with time to enjoy hunting deer and elk and shooting ducks. First there was the deer hunting season, open from October 1 to 20, with the first part of the duck season opening October 21 and due to close November 9. Then on October 25, open season of ten days began on the lovely elk on the westside of Highway 97. However, regarding the duck and geese situation, the birds are very conspicuous by their absence this year, and have not yet arrived here from the north on their annual migration to the sunny south.

Hunters coming here from outside points are disgustedly giving up and returning home after hunting in the vicinity and finding practically no ducks and geese in their usual haunts of other years, when hunting was excellent and the birds numerous. As to the elk open season here, it has caused no particular excitement, very few having to date availed themselves of the opportunity to bag one of the noble animals.

Those who have gone out west of here hunting elk, have found the

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tracks of the wily and elusive animals, with scarcely any elk being seen. This past summer, while out driving west of here, several valley folks saw many of the animals, including bulls, cows and calves, but now that the open season on them is on, they have indeed become hard to see, although one local resident reported that he saw six elk running through the trees and thick underbrush where it would have been impossible to draw a bead on them if he had a gun with him.

A storm bringing a good rain would more than likely help the duck and geese situation, but at this time our fine Indian summer weather is still continuing with no sign of an immediate change.

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Utilities' Value Tops 451 Million

SALEM, Nov. 2 (AP)—Public utilities in Oregon are worth \$451,500,000, the state tax commission said yesterday. Their assessed value, which is for tax purposes, is \$246,000,000, or 54.5 percent more than last year.

The railroads have the biggest value, \$185,732,000. Every one of the 36 counties has at least a little piece of railroad track except Curry.

Second largest are the electric companies, worth \$145,900,000. Then come the telephone and gas companies, worth \$81,000,000 and \$19,000,000.

Other utilities include, in the total are air lines, express, telegraph,

water, heating and bridge companies.
