Virgil B. Woodrum, 24-year-old brickyard worker, was convicted in circuit court yesterday afternoon on an indictment charging him with indecent exposure.

He will be sentenced Friday at 3 p. m.

The jury deliberated little over an hour before bringing in its verdict. The vote was 10-2 for conviction. A week ago Woodrum was acquitted of a similar charge.

The young man was accused of exposing himself before a 17-year-old Henley high school girl on S. 6th last June 17.

His \$1500 bond was continued pending passing sentence. Woodrum faces a possible sentence of a year in jail.

Nizza Drowning Accidental

MT. SHASTA — A coroner's jury last night rendered a verdict of accidental drowning in the case of Joseph Nizza, 38, whose body was recovered October 29 from the millpond of the Mount Shasta Pine Manufacturing company.

It was established that Nizza, who was clean-up man at the mill, drowned October 9.

A native of Italy, he had been a resident of Mt. Shasta for 40 years. He is survived by a brother John here.

Funeral services were held today in Noble's chapel, with Rev. Edward Christen officiating. Interment was in the Mt. Shasta cemetery.
