

'47 Accident Brings Suit For \$10,000

A suit seeking \$10,000 damages for personal injuries resulting from an automobile accident at Main and Esplanade on September 22, 1947, was filed by Phyllis Doty against Delores Prough and her husband Carl Prough in the county clerk's office yesterday afternoon.

According to the complaint Mrs. Prough was driver of an automobile belonging to her husband in which Phyllis Doty was a passenger at the time of the accident.

Charges The plaintiff charges she received "grave and lasting injuries" as the result of the accident, including a broken right rib, a deep cut on the nose, cuts of the forehead, and various cuts, bruises and lacerations of the body.

His paintings will include water colors done during the past two summers spent in Nevada, Montana, Wyoming, California and Oregon as well as many familiar local scenes and some of his famous Indian portraits.

The traveling exhibits at the Art Center include jewelry and ceramics of Franz Bergman internationally known designer, and the ceramics of Franz and Marguerite Wildgenheim who rank among the best in the world.

Klamath Falls business firms are cooperating with the Art association by donating exhibit space in their stores and show windows, so that there will be paintings exhibited in all downtown sections.

Open-air There will be open-air exhibits reminiscent of Paris and Greenwich Village on the sidewalk in front of the Klamath Flower shop extending into the Standard Service station at 12th and Main. The county and city libraries will have a large display of art books which are part of their permanent collection. Paintings will be exhibited in the lobby of the Pelican theatre, and in the following stores, Rickys La Pointe's, Palace Market, Reinhardt's and the Pelican Cafe Candy Jar.

Howard Perrin will exhibit the work he is now doing in the city in his architectural studio at 1121 Main. He will have open house on Saturday, November 5, from 1-4 p.m., and conducted tours showing how the studio works. Refreshments will be served.

Open House The architectural firm of Hewitt and Morrison and Howard, city planners, will have open house in their studio, the former offices of Sheldon Brumbaugh in Pine Grove, on Sunday from 3 to 4 p.m. There will be an exhibit of local work now being done and the paintings of John Howard, member of the firm. Refreshments will be served. The Art Center at 12th and Main will also have open house on Saturday and Sunday afternoon.

It was the 20-30 club, not the Kiwanis club who sponsored that party at Riverside school. I'm told that 13 of the boys turned out on their own time to put the thing over and entertain the kids. And they did a good job of it, too. One of the many reasons why we had a quiet Halloween night here. They deserve a lot of credit for it, as do all the other groups who did their part.

SPokane, Nov. 2 (AP)—Raymond Lewis, 44, of Spokane was charged with manslaughter yesterday in the accidental shooting last Sunday of Violet Packer, 40, of Spokane.

Mrs. Packer was fatally shot while she was hunting with five companions near Valley, Wash.

Delbert Scoles, Stevens county prosecutor, said Lewis orally admitted the shooting.

The manslaughter warrant was served in the office of the Spokane county sheriff where Lewis had come to be questioned by Stevens county officers.

"I turned around and went back over the point and stayed in the woods about an hour trying to make up my mind what to do." Lewis did not tell the other members of his party that he believed he had shot a woman until last night, Scoles said.
