

Fur Coat Tax Postponed Until March

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—The internal revenue bureau today postponed until March 1 the effective date of a ruling clamping the 20 per cent sales tax on all-fur coats without exception.

The postponement was in response to protests from manufacturers who would suffer loss unfairly unless given time to dispose of stocks acquired before the ruling.

The original ruling, made known yesterday and intended to be immediately effective, was designed to plug a loophole in the law under which some all-fur coats had gone tax free along with fur-trimmed cloth coats.

It provided that:

1. There can be no exception to the requirement that all-fur coats be subject to the 20 per cent tax on retail value.

2. Fur-trimmed cloth coats, on the other hand, will not be subject to tax if they meet this condition: that the second most valuable component of the coat be worth at least a third as much as the fur.

Copper King Guggenheim, Dies at 88

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., Nov. 3 (AP)—Solomon R. Guggenheim, senior member of America's great mining family, died here early today at his Long Island estate, Trillora Court. He was 88.

The multi-millionaire copper king was active in the family business until three weeks ago, when his health suddenly began to fail. His condition worsened early this week and his three daughters were called home.

His wife, Irene, was with him when he died, and a daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Obre, of Baltimore, also were present. His eldest daughter, Countess Castle Stewart, was reported flying home from England.

Guggenheim was the senior member of the firm of Guggenheim Brothers, and was the last survivor of the seven sons of Meyer Guggenheim, who started the family in the mining business in North and South America.

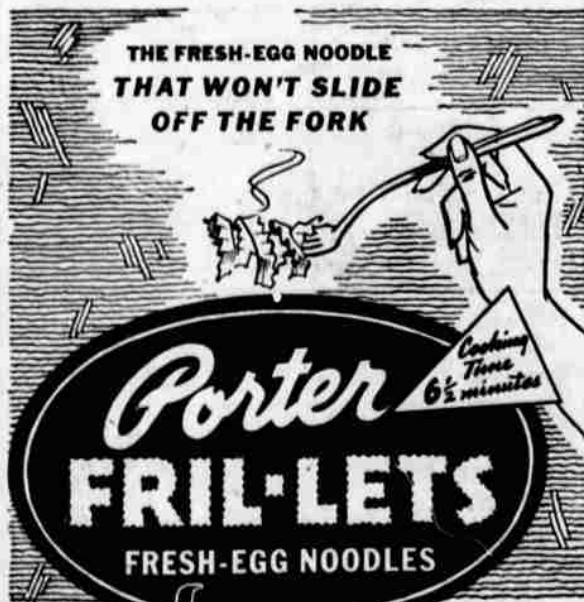
HIGH PRICED BULL

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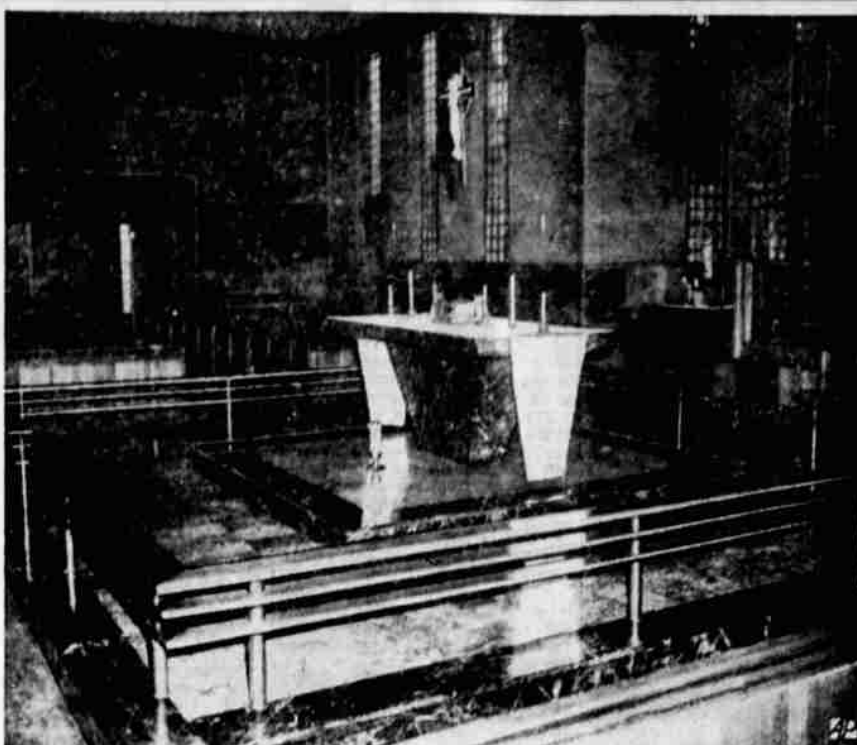

Nursing Home Under Fire

ASTORIA, Nov. 3 (AP)—The state board of health, which re-licensed a seaside nursing home last spring, was asked today to take another look at the situation. The Clatsop county welfare administration moved 10 patients from the home Saturday and said they were "inadequately attended."

Mrs. Bertha Roth, county administrator, identified the place as Mary's nursing home. She said there had been numerous complaints and the state board made an investigation last spring, then continued the license.

The operator of the home, Mrs. Mary E. Aschenbrenner, blamed employees for complaints. She said they had been lax while she and her husband were in Portland.

Nobel Literature Award Deadlocked

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 3 (AP)—The Swedish academy decided today to shelve this year's Nobel prize for literature because it was hopelessly deadlocked over four top candidates, including Winston Churchill and the Italian philosopher Benedetto Croce.

The tug-of-war on the prize decision was reported to have been greater than any time during the half century in which the 18-member academy has been making the award.

Portland Bridge Hopes Brighten

PORTLAND, Nov. 3 (AP)—Portland's jammed bridges may get relief sooner than expected. The steel bridge was closed Oc-

tober 10 while new approach ramps were connected to the West side. The closure was expected to last 60 days and during that period traffic was diverted to other spans, causing a particularly heavy jam on the Broadway bridge.

Yesterday the state highway commission's Resident Engineer, J. T. Skelton, said work was ahead of schedule and the bridge might be re-opened in 14 to 21 days.
