The 20-year-old lad from Altoona, Pa., won first honors in the weekly Associated Press poll for his solid play against Georgia Tech. "I can sure thank the other boys for that honor," he said. "Using that eight-man line against Tech, they made it easy for me to look good."

Both the Klamath Union high school Pelicans and the Oregon Technical Institute Owls take to the road for week-end football battles this week but there may be different tunes warbled on return trips.

The Pelicans, in red-hot form after walloping Grants Pass, 39 to 21, will be favored to add the Wolves of Redding's Shasta high to its string of king-X victories. The game is set for Friday night in the northern California city.

The Owls, on the other hand, tackle the Vanport college Vikings in Portland Saturday night and will play the role of underdog.

However, all isn't mean and groan on the mile-high campus. The Owls, setting a new mark for injuries this season, are on the mend—and except for two instances—will field a robust team.

John Paasch, co-captain and end, is out for the season with a shoulder injury. An ankle hurt will keep Reserve Back Dick Nason occupying the bench.

However, Russ Johnston, tackle; Chuck Warren, sparkplug halfback; Wayne Chapman, lineman; Don Abernathy, guard; and Dean Weekley, fullback have beaten injuries and will be ready for the Viking mix.

MILL WILL PLAY
Center Dick Mill, still favoring a knee injury, will be used in the offensive department, Coach Dale Daugherty announced.

The Pels are at full strength for the non-league game, a sandwich affair before the conference Bend game Armistice day.

The Wolves of Shasta have a fair-to-middlin' grid record this season although its 40-12 loss of the Black Tornado of Medford will make the Pels an odds-on choice.

The Pels walloped Medford 21 to 6. A win for Hendershot's charges would mark its seventh straight.

The Vanport struggle could be a stand-off clash. The only rival met by both the Owls and the Vikings this season is the Oregon College Wolves. Monmouth had to come from behind to beat Vanport 25-13; the Owls, riddled with injuries, was an easy prey for the fast Monmouth backs and hard-charging line two weeks ago. OCE won 33-0 with comparative ease.

The last Vikings start resulted in a 20-0 blank to the Oregon frosh.

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Mangrum Hurt In Fist Fray

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 3 (AP)—Lloyd Mangrum, fourth of last season's list of pro golf money winners, is likely to be out of tournament play the rest of this year as the result of an injured shoulder.

Mangrum, 35, and his wife were passengers in the automobile of a friend yesterday when it was in a collision with another machine. A police report said the golfer suffered an injured shoulder during an altercation with the driver of the other machine.

Mrs. Mangrum said arrangements were made for an operation today in Santa Monica hospital to repair damaged muscles. He will not be able to play in the Philippine Open tournament and probably in no other competition earlier than the Los Angeles Open in January.

Mangrum was the 1946 U. S. Open champion and won the Los Angeles Open and the All-America tournament at the Tam O' Shanter club, Chicago, this year.
