

OTI Beefs Discussed At Parley

A meeting between OTI student-residents of the Mountain View housing project and Winston Purvine, Oregon Tech superintendent, reportedly was under way today at the school to iron out difficulties arising at the school-operated housing project.

Early this afternoon no news had been received from the meeting.

Petition
Some 24 Mountain View residents yesterday had signed a petition asking for a reduction in the \$39 a month rental at the housing unit or a change in the management of the project.

However, the demands for a change in the management are by no means unanimous. The manager, Norman Miller, is receiving support from many students at Mountain View who declare Miller is not to blame for the housing project difficulties.

The residents are virtually unanimous in believing they are paying too much rent.

Nurses Needed For Indian Reservations

Registered nurses are needed to meet a serious nurse shortage in hospitals on Indian reservations in four Western states. The Red Cross has been asked to assume some responsibility in helping the hospitals give at least a minimum service to the sick because of its present disaster relief policy to assist governmental agencies in time of emergency.

Twenty-two nurses are urgently needed immediately. This situation and need for nurses is considered critical until the first of the year, when, it is hoped, the efforts of the Civil Service commission may permanently solve the problem.

All registered nurses in Klamath county available for this emergency service are asked to contact the Red Cross office in Klamath Falls for additional information.

Judge Refuses Klamath Bid For Fugitives

A federal judge in Las Vegas has turned down Klamath county's bid for custody of two young men charged here with car theft but free on probation in Nevada.

The men are Leonard Libera and Ralph Ronald Rader, both 24, who are accused of stealing a car owned by Stanley Anderson of Malin September 24.

Arrested
They were arrested two days later at Lovelock, Nev., and the car recovered. Libera and Rader were taken into federal court at Las Vegas for violation of the Dyer act, taking a stolen car across state lines, and were placed on probation there.

Sheriff Jack Frney attempted to have them taken into custody for return here to face the car theft charges, but learned yesterday the federal court had denied Klamath county's request.

Big California Coast Area Sinking; Property Worth Millions in Peril

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP) — A 12-square mile area on the Los Angeles-Long Beach, Calif., harbor is sinking two inches every month, endangering \$500,000,000 worth of property, a naval officer said today.

The land has dropped more than nine feet since 1937, Comdr. Lewis C. Cox, public works officer of the Long Beach naval shipyard, told the waterways division of the American Society of Civil Engineers, in convention here.

Cox said in his prepared speech that earth dikes have been thrown up to protect industrial establishments affected by the drooping of the land and money has been appropriated for concrete walls to protect the naval shipyard, which has \$100,000,000 worth of equipment.

Removal of oil and gas from the Wilmington oil field is blamed for the subsidence, Cox said.

Engineers and geologists estimate the subsidence may reach 18 to 23 feet by 1963 unless methods can be found to stop or retard it.

One plan under study is to reduce rate of oil and gas removal so that

groundwater would have time to trickle through to replace them—at levels of 3500 to 7000 feet—and the other is to pump water under high pressure into the oil zones to replace the oil and gas.

Sad Little Story Silver Lined

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3 (AP) — There is a silver lining to this sad little story about the 80-year-old woman arrested on a charge of begging.

The woman is Miss Louisa Schmidt, who officers said was begging small change from men along the sidewalk yesterday.

Policemen found the silver lining pinned to her undergarments in the form of \$2122 in currency.

HOUSTON, Nov. 3 (AP) — Bus drivers in Texas' largest city went on strike at 12:01 a. m. today but reached an agreement with management at 12:10 p. m. The short-lived strike of 1100 members of the CIO Transport Workers union was the first major transportation tie-up in history for this city of more than 500,000 people.

Russian Claims New Atom Find

MOSCOW, Nov. 3 (AP) — A top Russian scientist today said Soviet scientists in the past year have discovered hitherto unknown characteristics of radiation from atomic nuclei.

This was only one of a number of scientific discoveries claimed for Russian physicists and astronomers by Sergei Vavilov, president of the academy of sciences of the USSR, in an article in Izvestia, the government newspaper.

Vavilov did not elaborate on the nature of characteristics of atomic radiation discovered.
