Bend Hospital Bids Opened

BEND, Nov. 3 (AP)—Directors of the Central Oregon Hospital foundation opened bids Tuesday from 30 contractors who want to build this city's new hospital.

Basic bids were divided into three classes, lows were offered by J. W. Wise, Boise, at \$538,798 for the general work; A. T. Rushlight, Portland, \$135,190 for the plumbing and heating; Ace Electric company, Portland, \$30,463 for the electrical work.

The directors said alternate specifications and prices may result in contractors other than the low bidders getting the work. They will meet again Thursday.

Artic Tern, Half-pound Ace Of Air, Makes Long Hops

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mother nature has taken no part in the B-36 controversy, but she could say a thing or two about it if she wished. The air force people boast of the B-36's range—a little more than 10,000 miles. But mother nature for thousands of years has had a little half-pound flying machine, the Arctic tern, which makes two 11,000-mile flights a year—non-stop, but even so that's some flying. The bird summers in the Arctic and winters in the Antarctic.

Its seasonal migration, which is going on right now, is the longest of any bird. Arctic terns from Alaska and other western parts of North America fly directly south. But those who summer in eastern North America make a mysterious side-trip to Europe and Africa before heading for the south pole. You practically never find an Arctic tern on the Atlantic coast of North America south of northern Massachusetts.

Theory

One theory about this side trip is that the Arctic tern's ancestors came from Europe. So before they take up their winter residence in the Antarctic they make a sentimental journey home. They fly east across the Atlantic towards Scotland or France, then sail south along the western coast of Europe and Africa.

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Lost Youth Tried Fishing With Trousers

WEIPPE, Idaho, Nov. 3 (AP)—An Iowa college boy told yesterday how he seined for fish with his trousers while he was lost in the mountain wilderness of Northern Idaho.

Harvey Sperry, 19, of Charles City, Ia., made it back to civilization—unhurt—after three days and two nights of wandering in the dense and hilly forest northwest of Weippe.

Harvey lost his way Sunday when he went to help bring out an elk shot by another hunter.

Fire

On his first night in the open, it took all of his supply of three

matches to get a fire started. He buried himself under boughs from a fir tree and spent the night comfortably.

Hunger was his problem on the second day and it remained a problem.

"I tried to unravel one of my wool socks to make a fishline out of it," Sperry said. "That didn't work."

"Then I took off my heavy waterproof pants and tied the bottoms of the legs together to try to seine some fish from the stream. That didn't work either."

Fern Bed

With no matches to build a fire he tore up a huge pile of ferns for his bed the second night.

Sperry got his bearings the next morning and started for the most prominent lookout in the area. On the way he found a logging road and arrived at a Potlatch forest camp northwest of Weippe about 2:30 in the afternoon.

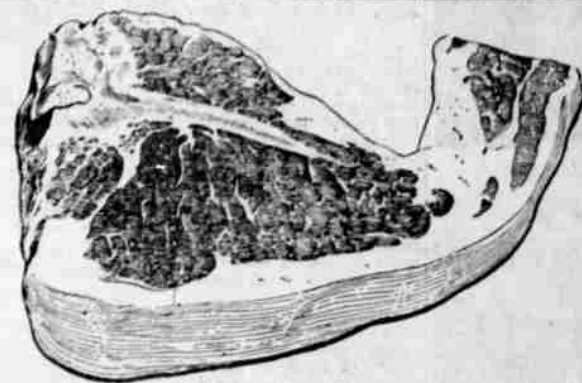
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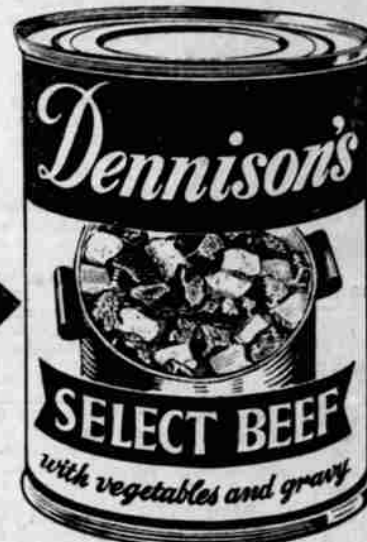
