

# Parents Must Rule Children In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW—The city ordinance providing punishment for parents or guardians who cause their children to become delinquent through failure to properly supervise or control the youngsters was signed into law by Mayor Harry J. Anthony at the council meeting Tuesday night. The law was approved by the council at the October meeting but could not be signed until a draft had been drawn up by City Attorney T. S. McKinney.

The law provides a penalty of not more than \$200 fine or not more than 100 days in jail for violators.

The law is aimed at parents, guardians and others who have custody of children under 18 years of age whose charges become dependent or delinquent due to lack of supervision or control. The ordinance is modeled on one adopted at Baker, Ore., in August, 1947, with good results.

# E. W. Roberts Of Lakeview Dies in Sleep

LAKEVIEW—Elwood W. Roberts, 70, well known timber operator in this region for many years, died suddenly in sleep Thursday, November 3. He was found Thursday morning by a neighbor.

Mr. Roberts was born in 1879 in Ontario, Canada, coming to the United States when he was five years old. He has resided at Lakeview for 37 years, operating as a logging contractor and timber broker most of that time. In more recent years, much of Mr. Roberts' time has been given to a campaign for debt free, or constitutional money.

**Survivors**

Mr. Roberts is survived by a wife, Thomas E. Roberts of New Pine Creek, Ore.; by two sisters, one of whom is Mrs. Wilkie Collins of Canada, and by two grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted Saturday, November 5, at 2 p.m. from the Ousley-Osteman chapel with Rev. Omer Isdo, Methodist minister, officiating. Interment will be in Sunset Park cemetery here.

# Recreation, School Unit Church Aim

LAKEVIEW—Construction of a building to house a recreation hall and a parochial school of four elementary rooms is the aim of a fund-raising campaign now under way by members of St. Patrick's Catholic church.

The plan is not new. It was started by the late Ernest Petch and is being carried on in his name by his son, Carter Petch, as general chairman. The group already has \$2500 and numerous large donations are promised.

The immediate aim is construction of a hall for Sunday school classes and social functions, which the group hopes also to make available to their non-Catholic friends. The classrooms will come later as money becomes available.

The group plans to buy ground for the building when the sum of \$5000 has been reached. They do not wish to go in debt for any part of the project as their parish is free of debt.

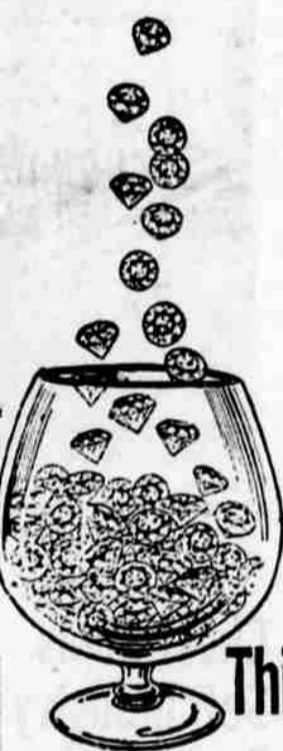
