Vet's Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper will publish an occasional column of news briefs from the veterans administration. For further information veterans should contact or write their nearest VA office.

Some Oregon veterans may find all or part of their share of the forthcoming special dividend payment on national service life insurance deducted because they owe the government money as a result of overpayments on subsistence allowances or other veteran benefits, the veterans administration reports.

Approximately 600,000 veterans are currently indebted to the VA for a total of about 70 million dollars. The VA estimated that somewhere between 20 and 30 million dollars of such debts may be collected from the NSLI dividends.

Bulk of the money owed the VA constitutes overpayments on subsistence allowances for veterans taking educational courses or training under the GI bill. Other types of indebtedness are overpayments on pensions, compensation or readjustment allowances, and losses made good to lenders on defaulted GI loans.

All of the veterans concerned are aware of their indebtedness to the government and know that it is deductible from other VA payments to which they may be entitled, the VA said. A considerable number of veterans are now repaying indebtedness by having deductions from their monthly checks. When the overpayment is wiped out, as it may be by the dividend deductions, there will be no further monthly withholding.

New Lakeview Street Lights About Ready

LAKEVIEW—Installation of the long-awaited street lights will be completed today or tomorrow with the full crew of the California Oregon Power company pushing the work. There will be 30 of the powerful new mercury-vapor lamps, each of which puts out 16,000 lumens.

Installation was delayed for many weeks awaiting arrival of the arms on which to suspend the lamps from the poles. Materials were contracted to Van's Electric and that firm struck a snag on getting delivery of the arms although the lampshades themselves arrived many weeks ago.

The new lights will be turned on and off by special switching equipment which will operate according to the amount of daylight, a photo-electric mechanism. The switching equipment, and also special transformers for each light, is furnished by Copco.

Ship Grounded, Crew Safe

SEATTLE, Nov. 4 (AP)—An engine room fire drove the freighter Andalus to ground on a Northwestern Washington beach early today. A crew of 27 was safe aboard.

The coast guard reported later that the fire was out. The grounding ended two hours of uncertainty after the first fire alarm from the 7117-ton Panamanian registered freighter. The fire was reported extinguished by the crew.

It rammed around a few miles from the most Northwestern tip of the continental United States.
