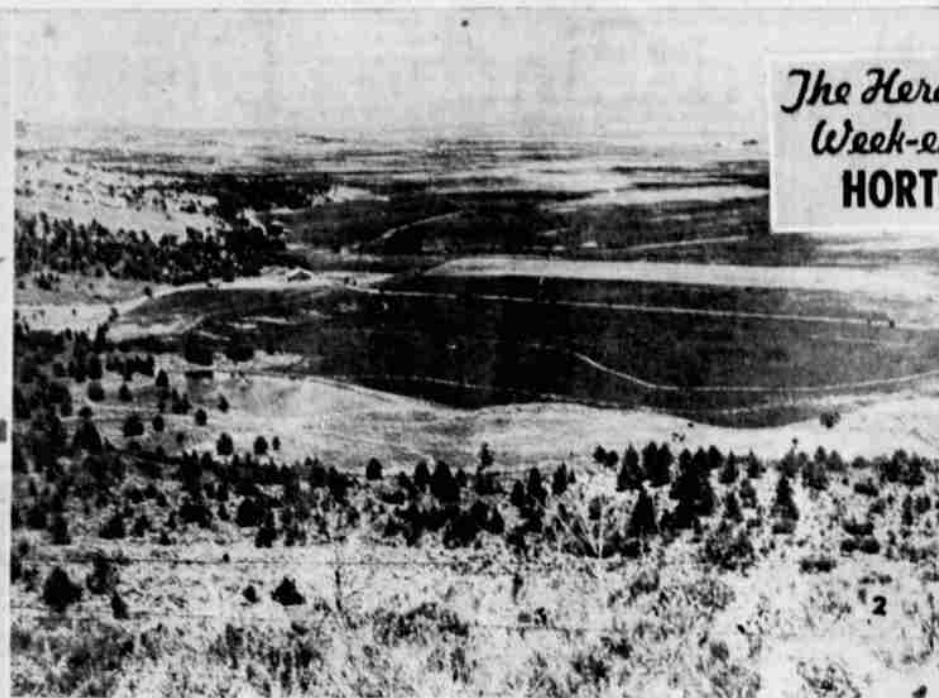
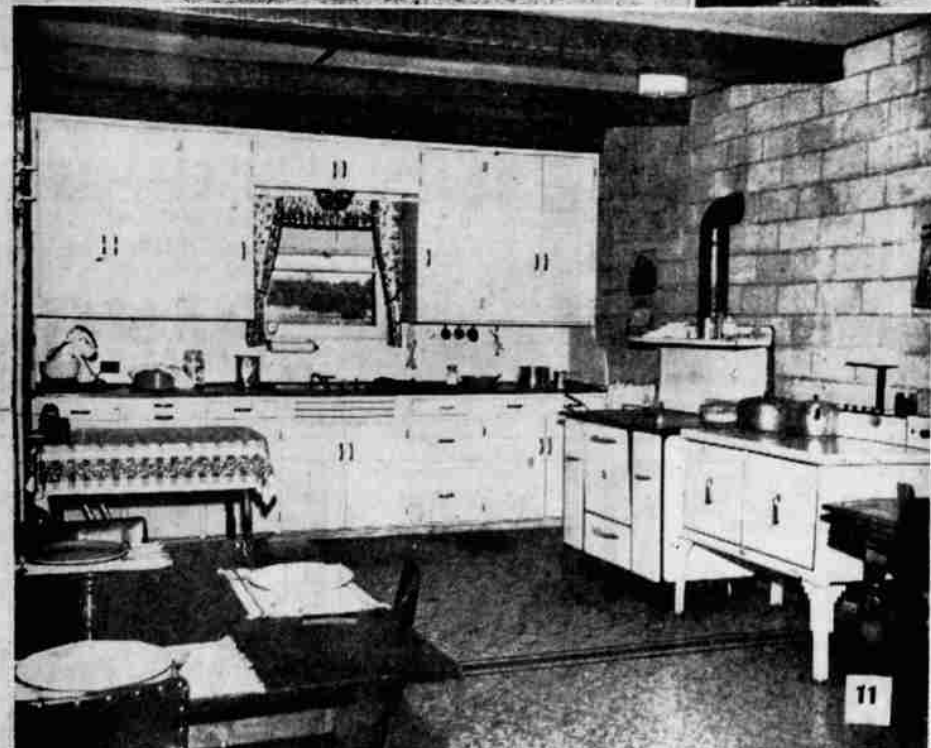
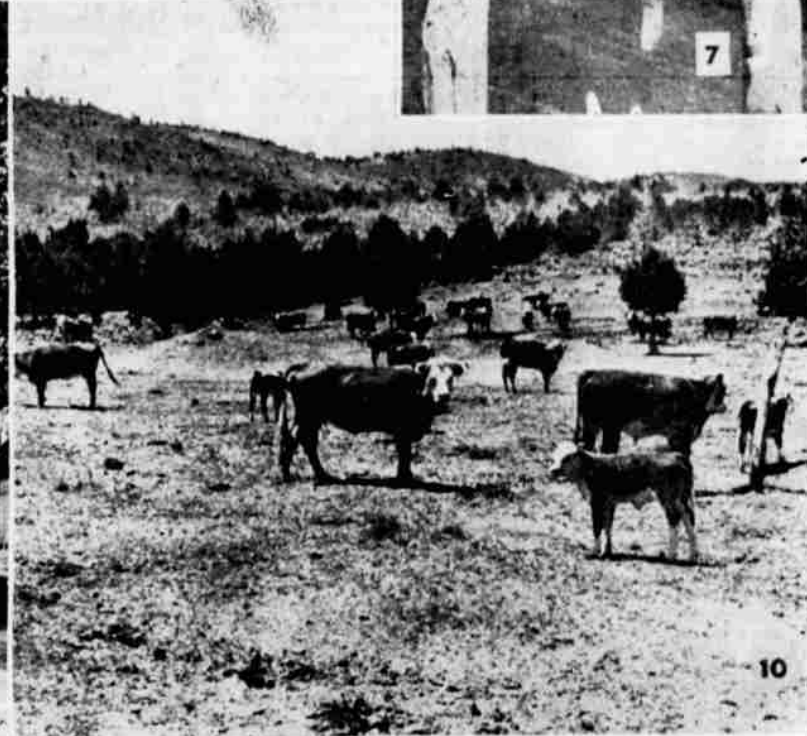
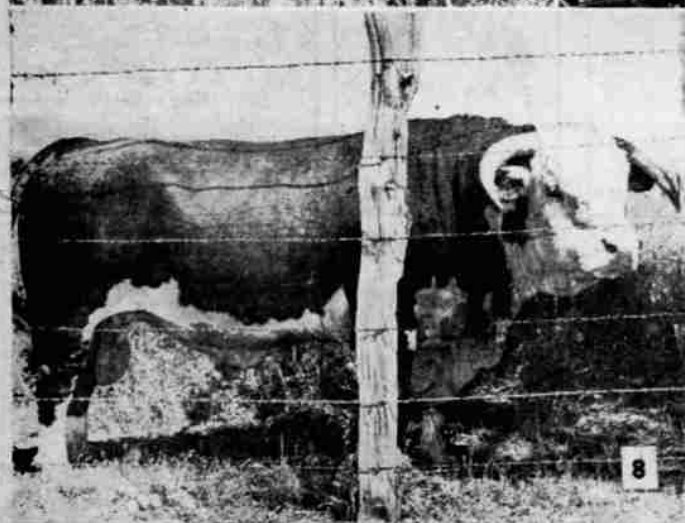
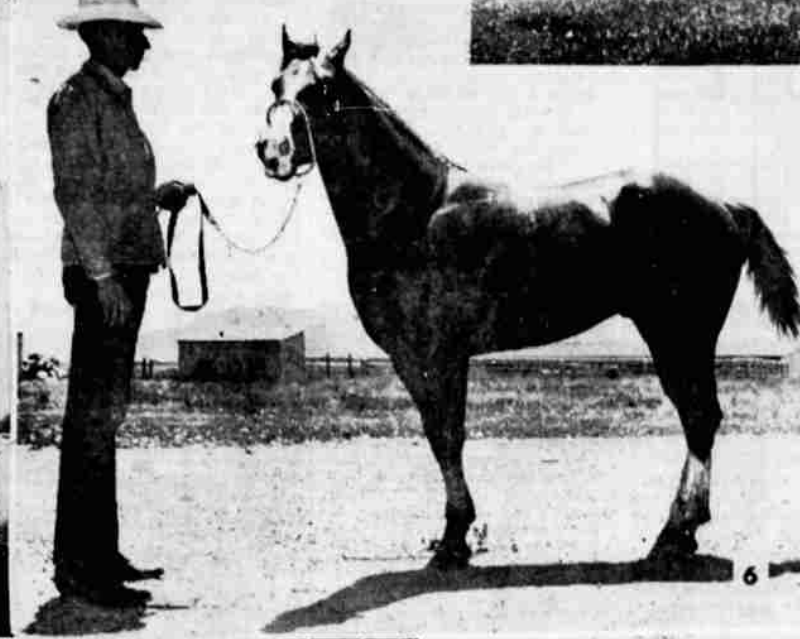

HORTON RANCH



1 **LAWRENCE HORTON**, one of Klamath county's best known ranchers, looks over the land as son John points from the vantage of a white rail fence. Lawrence leaves the cattle and horses up to John who has a natural bent for this sort of thing. Another son, Bob, runs the Yonna valley place. The Hortons also have a daughter, Joan Hardman, who lives at Tulelake.

2 **THIS FINE VIEW OF YONNA VALLEY** was taken by Wes Cuderian, The Herald and News photographer, from the winding road on Horton hill. The Horton place is at the left and nestled against a grove of junipers.

3 **GRACIOUS HOSTS WERE** Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Horton at their Poe valley ranch house. They are pictured near a huge Carolina poplar which Lawrence planted when he was 5 years old. Frequently such lengthy assignments are tasks for newspaper people, but the fine hospitality of the Hortons made the day's

job all too short. The garden is Mrs. Horton's pride and joy. She met Lawrence Horton a number of years ago when she came to Olene to teach school. She never went back to Medford, her home town.

4 **PRETTY LOUISA KELLER HORTON**, who married Bob Horton this spring, tests the ice cold water from an artesian well which flows into a clear lake and from which the Yonna valley stock and fields are watered.

5 **LOUISA AND BOB HORTON** started housekeeping this spring in a charming house which is modern in every detail. Bob manages the Yonna valley holdings; his hobby is photography and wood working.

6 **MONTÉ CARLO** felt his oats the day this picture was taken. His proud owner, John Horton, with Monte Carlo, a copper colored quarter horse who took the grand championship at the Pacific Northwest Quarter-horse show in Pendleton on May 15.

7 **THIS IS THE SIGN** at the Lawrence Horton place in Poe valley.

8 **SLIGHTLY BORED** but willing to pose is one of Horton's nine registered Hereford bulls. This fine fellow is Superior Royal out of Royal Lad 2nd. The dame is Miss Supreme.

9 **ONE OF THE SHOW PLACES OF** Poe valley is the Lawrence Horton ranch, well situated with a verdant background of wide lawns and fine old trees. You couldn't tell it—but this residence is built around the original home built by Lawrence's grandfather, William Harrison Horton, more than 70 years ago.

10 **SLEEK WHITE FACES** mother their calves at Horton's Yonna valley ranch at the foot of Horton hill.

11 **ATTRACTIVE COOK HOUSE** on the Lawrence Horton ranch at Poe valley has color as well as the last word in modern equipment. The family eats its meals in this cook house, a far cry from the old type of cook

house where the "range boss" sweltered over a hot wood stove during the busiest seasons.

12 **BRAND SPANKING NEW** is the home of Robert and Louisa Horton in Yonna valley. The shade comes from aged apple trees planted by the Shooks many years ago. Here Louisa prepared a delicious luncheon for The Herald and News visitors. Bob was the architect and builder for this home which is in stark comparison to the log cabin down the road where his grandmother, Nettie Colohan, was born.

13 **THIS OLD LOG HOUSE**, the pine paneling still strong, was built by Lawrence Horton's maternal grandfather, J. C. Colohan, and stands at the foot of Horton hill where the road winds past to the present farmhouse. It was here that Lawrence's mother, Nettie Colohan, was born.
