Pels "Different"

I asked myself this question several times and, strangely enough, the answer was so evident it wasn't immediately spotted.

My guess is this. There is no one STICKOUT star on the Pels this season. The whole team sticks out as a matter of fact. It operates AS A TEAM. Sure, Huck gets the headlines one game for scoring three times, Joe Nichols may cop the major attraction for his gassed-up power and tackle. John Little and Tom Abner and Guards Dick Peterson and Roy Lundgren may catch the eye in one game—but the Pelicans are not a team that have ONE INDIVIDUAL who is guiding the destinies of the team with a rifle arm or twinkling underpinning.

And that, I think, is the major reason for the Pels now occupying a position into which pre-season dopsters figured they didn't have a look-see.

Joe Star may win a few games for a team but unless ten guys named Joe—as far as the public is concerned—are not opening holes, cutting down tacklers and carrying out supporting roles the star-led team is not a coach's dream.

Ask Bob Henderson. He's a coach who is keeping the Pels working as eleven operating parts. Ask Grants Pass also. They hadn't heard much about Gaylor Hick. And the little setback would have been just another member of the backfield without the strong supporting help he got from ten boys who were putting out.

LA Rams, Eagles Tangle

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—Sixteen major league pro football teams will see action tomorrow, but the clash between Los Angeles and Philadelphia in the National circuit really commands top billing.

The game at Shibe Park, Philadelphia, pits the hometown Eagles against the only unbeaten outfit in either the National league or the All-America conference. The invading Rams take a 6-0 record into the first of a three-game road trip which is expected to see the western division leaders clinching a playoff berth.

The Eagles, defending league champions, top the eastern division with five triumphs against one loss. Other National league contests tomorrow find Green Bay at Chicago Bears, New York Bulldogs at Washington and Chicago Cardinals at Detroit.

Three AAC games are scheduled: Buffalo at New York Yankees, Chicago at Cleveland and San Francisco at Baltimore.

There could be a three-way tie for the NFL's eastern division leadership after tomorrow's fireworks. Pittsburgh and the Giants are deadlocked for second position, each with four wins and two losses to date. Either can draw even with Philadelphia should the Eagles bow to the Rams.

The three AAC games aren't likely to budget the top teams from their lofty perches. The Yankees, Cleveland Browns and San Francisco 49ers all are favored to win and can clinch playoff spots by doing so.

REDDING, Nov. 3 (Special)—A sputtering Klamath Falls grid machine came to life in the second half last night to produce three touchdowns and down a stubborn Shasta eleven, 31 to 13.

The Pelicans in the first half were a far cry from the team that walloped Grants Pass last week and went to the dressing rooms at the half, trailing the Redding Wolves, 13-12.

Although the Pels struck in the first four minutes of the game for a touchdown pass from Gene Carlson to Dorin Van Lee, good for a nine-yard tally, Redding took the lead later in the first stanza and held it throughout the half.

Bob McPherson failing on the extra point after Klamath's first touchdown.

Shasta scored with an intricate triple reverse and forward pass to Spears who culminated a 55-yard scoring play when he snagged the ball. Redding's Gilmore ran over the extra point and the Shastas led, 7 to 6.

TAKE LEAD
Early in the second quarter, Redding took a 13-6 lead when Millhouse scored on a running play. Klamath came back with a pass from Bob McPherson to Tom Schuster good for a 30 yard touchdown but again the try for the added point failed.

It was a determined Pel team that took the field in the second half.

In the third stanza, Klamath took the lead again when Joe Demetras ended a long drive with an 18-yard gallop into pay dirt.

CARLSON SCORES
Gene Carlson, in fine running form, wrapped up the game in the last quarter with two touchdowns.

Both tallies came in the wake of long downfield surges. Carlson went six yards for one score, four yards for the last tally.

Demetras kicked the extra point after the fourth Pel tally, the only conversion of the evening.

Redding had the best of the statistics column in the first half but couldn't get a scoring spark under way in the last half.

Hillsboro joined the ranks of district prep football champions today after edging McMinnville, 6-0, in the opening minutes of a game last night.

The Hillsboro Spartans took the opening kickoff and marched 71 yards to a touchdown that gave them the district 6 championship. Jerry Leblanc played over the final yard.

The victory placed Hillsboro alongside Klamath Falls and Marshfield in playoff berths for the state prep football championship. One unbeaten powerhouse crashed badly in prep play last night. Central Catholic, the district 7 leader, suffered its first defeat at the hands of Camas, Wash., 19-13.

The muddled district 4 race came through the night just as muddled as ever. University High of Eugene, the last unbeaten team in the district, tumbled to Lebanon, 7-0.

The Salem Vikings, upset last week, bounced back to defeat Astoria, 26-6, in an inter-district tilt. Eugene, contending with Salem for the title, was swamped, 19-6, by Marshfield, the district 3 titlist. Albany and Gresham fought to a 6-6 deadlock.

Hood River, a favorite in district 5 competition before losing two straight games, returned to the victory path with an 18-6 win over Battle Ground, Wash.

The defending champions from Grants Pass resumed their winning ways with a 20-14 defeat of Roseburg—but it came too late to give the Caveemen another chance at the state crown.

In district 1, Pendleton defeated Hermiston, 33-13, and Milton-Freewater defeated St. Patrick's of Walla Walla, 34-19. The district leader, La Grande, sat the week-end out.

The Shastan team which got burned out of its gymnasium in mid-week showed its immunity to such catastrophe by walloping Salem Bible academy, 49-0, last night.

But that whitewashing was topped by still more astronomical scores. Monmouth beat Philomath, 53-0, and Clatskanie squashed Garibaldi, 57-14.

Most of the Portland prep play was wound up yesterday, but the key game—between Grant and Roosevelt—will decide the championship next Thursday.

Green Work Gives Snead Golf Victory

PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 3 (AP)—For a long time now the locker room gentry have been saying that when Sammy Snead is putting, nobody playing golf today can beat him.

The balding, 37-year-old PGA champion from White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., was putting yesterday as he put on a whirlwind finish to sprint home a six-stroke winner in the North and South Open tournament after clinging grimly to the lead by one stroke through the first three rounds.

The slammer blazed around the No. 2 Pinehurst Country club course in six-under-par 66 on his final four of his 69.52 yards. This followed earlier rounds of 68-70-70 and left him with 274, 14 under par, and only three above the record Ben Hogan set in 1942.

Johnny Bulla, always a stroke behind through the first three rounds, when he had 69-70-70, finished with 71 for 280 and second place. The Pittsburgh pro, now playing from Southern Pines, N. C., was eight under par although beaten by six strokes.

Third place went to National Open King Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, now representing an Ormond Beach, Fla., club. He was never over par for his four rounds, closing with 72-71 for 283.

Pancho Shoots For Two in Row

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 3 (AP)—A newcomer to professional tennis, Pancho Gonzalez, 21-year-old Los Angeles national amateur champion, will try here tonight to make it two match victories in a row over pro-king Jack Kramer.

Gonzalez broke Kramer's three-match string of victories yesterday in Cleveland 6-2, 6-2. The pair's record on the cross-country exhibition tour is now 4-2 in Kramer's favor.

Galileo Produces Athletes

SAN FRANCISCO—The big stick of New York Yankee third sacker Bobby Brown in the World Series brings to mind a high school hero, a kid who produced a good share of the nation's top athletes.

Brown is one of the latest in a procession of Galileo high school graduates.

He drove out six hits in 12 times at bat in the recent series. His six hits came in his last eight trips to the plate. In the Yankees' Series win over Brooklyn in 1947, he appeared three times as a pinch hitter and hit safely each time.

Brown graduated from the North Beach School in 1941 and then went to Stanford.

But Galileo's top-notchers didn't start with Brown.

Here's the athletic "who's who" of the school in the past two decades:

1929—Lawson Little, national amateur golf champion in 1934 and 35, and national open titleholder in 1940. He also won the British amateur in 34 and 35.

1934—Angelo (Hank) Luisetti, Stanford basketball star from 1934 through 1937, who held national intercollegiate four-year scoring record and often has been called the greatest collegiate player the game has seen.

1934—Dominic DiMaggio of the Boston Red Sox—star center fielding brother of Yankee Joe.

1936—Larry Dee, who twice won the national intercollegiate doubles tennis title while at Stanford—he partnered with James Wade in 1940 and Davis Cup ace Ted Schroeder in 1942 for the tandem crown.

1939—Grover Klemmer, who tied the world record of 46.4 for the 440-yard run while at the University of California in 1941.

1947—Patsy Elsener, a member of the last Olympic women's diving team, and third place winner at London.

1948—Grant Butcher, 1948 winner of the National AAU light-heavyweight boxing title.

It seems Galileo has a top claim to the most consistent high school production of outstanding athletes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—Major league farm bosses insist there is no "ceiling" on practical operations of baseball chains, but you notice that a lot of clubs are cutting down to a limit of somewhere between ten and 15 affiliates. . . . Beyond that the operation apparently becomes too expensive for the number of good players developed, though one operator points out that a couple of money-making farms can carry a lot of the load. . . . On the other side, minor leaguers complain that most working agreements are unsatisfactory and that the majors saddle the little clubs with too big a share of the expenses. . . . But the little guys can't go it alone because they can't compete for talent nor support expensive scouting staffs. . . . Right now there are some 400 minor league clubs. If each big league club should limit itself to 15 farms, that would take care of 240 of them.

Maybe the answer is that a lot of towns want baseball but can't support organized teams at present-day prices. . . . If you can figure out what to do for them, you'll have a lot of fodder for hot-soap discussions—and probably nothing more.

Penn State's dramatic organization, the Thespians, has voted an honorary membership to Jim Dragotta, Syracuse end, for "the greatest piece of dramatic acting ever seen on Beaver field." . . . Seems that in last Saturday's Penn State-Syracuse game, with the ball on the one yard line and only a few seconds left to play, Dragotta fell flat a notable performance of staggering price. . . . If you can figure out what to do for them, you'll have a lot of fodder for hot-soap discussions—and probably nothing more.
