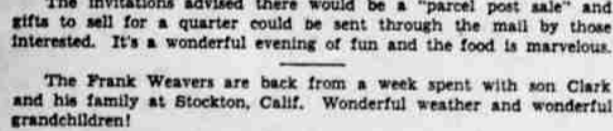

Trophies for the year's men's tournaments will be presented during the evening.

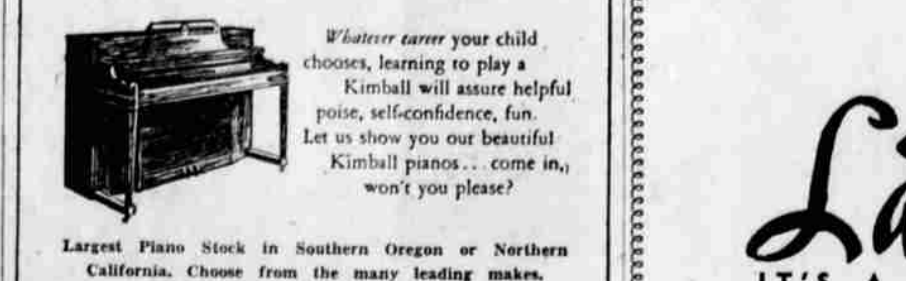
The cocktail hour is from 9 until 10 o'clock, and dancing from 10 until 2 o'clock, with Morrison and McDonald playing.
