

# Birthday of United Nations Is Theme

Mrs. C. W. Burningham, chairman of the United Nations committee for the league, led the meeting with a talk on the accomplishments of the United Nations, among them, averting of a major war in Palestine; the work done by the Indonesian commission in setting the Netherland-Indonesian trouble, and the breaking up of the Berlin deadlock.

The conclusion was drawn that on the whole the year has been one of progress.

Mrs. Everett Dennis talked on the Genocide convention or treaty, first brought up in the Geneva convention in 1946. The word "Genocide" was coined by Dr. Raphael Lemkin, now a professor of law at Yale. The word is used to designate the international crime of destroying a whole group of people on such grounds as national, racial, or religious beliefs. The effort to pass this Genocide treaty was met with success in the United Nations by a unanimous vote. To become an international law, Mrs. Dennis said, it will be necessary to be ratified by twenty nations, four having taken this necessary action, and it is expected to come up before our own senate soon.

Mrs. Fred A. Karlson's topic was Human Rights, the theme being developed on the rights of groups rather than of individuals. She quoted from Mrs. Roosevelt, U. N. chairman on Human Rights, and from Herbert D. Eysatt's who said that almost every great problem with which the world is faced today was placed before the general assembly in one form or another and that peace in Palestine has been an especial occupation of the assembly. He brought out that no one could expect the United Nations in a few short weeks or months to settle major political problems which for years have defied solution by direct negotiation.

Members of the league were greatly interested in the way the work of the United Nations is being taught in the public schools as outlined by Mr. G. E. Robertson of the public school system.

Florence Pilkey's description of the observance of the birthday of the United Nations in the Riverside school brought lumps to the throats of her listeners. A marvelously coordinated program was prepared at that school, with the students making the flags of all members nations and accomplishing other feats which built a real picture of the work of the UN in the minds of the student body. Among other things on this Riverside school program were talks by war brides whose native countries are now members of the UN.

Mrs. Frances Alderise gave an interesting talk on the methods of interpreting the various speeches used in the United Nations meetings and especially stressed the difficulties in expressing the exact meaning of one language in another, and the importance of such being accomplished, but even more the importance of being able to convey the feeling or emotion from one language to another.

The entire group felt that the afternoon had been most profitable and the program one of the best the league had ever put on.

A meeting scheduled for Wednesday night, November 9, has had to be postponed due to a conflict with other meetings and the actual meeting date will be announced by President Dorothea Buck at a later date.
