Doctor Says

Plastic Surgery Great Aid

Surgery aimed at repairing physical defects present at birth or scars sustained in war or accidents has become enormously successful since the first world war. Many people with deformed noses, protruding ears, or other peculiarities which mar their looks can now be restored to an appearance which, if not beautiful, at least makes them attractive and less conspicuous.

The methods of plastic surgery used to accomplish these results are often complicated, time-consuming, and expensive. It is frequently necessary, for example, to take cartilage from one of the patient's own ribs and to use it in reconstructing a nose, an ear, or some other part. The transplantation of such tissues requires the establishment of a new blood supply and this takes time. The same thing is true of skin grafting when it is necessary to cover some part of the body with skin removed from some other place.

"Face Lifting"
There is something about the field of plastic surgery which has brought into it some who promise things they cannot perform or are otherwise not fair with the patient. For example, there was a period during which "face lifting" was frequently requested by elderly women whose normal aging caused their skin to become loose and sag. It was quite common to treat this by injecting under the skin some kind of waxy substance which would give the cheeks a certain fullness. This was not safe, however, and many serious results occurred and "face lifting" has, therefore, been pretty well abandoned.

It is certainly wise for anyone who feels the need for plastic surgery to obtain the advice and efforts of only the best in that field.

Tugwell Tells Britons How U.S. Governed

LONDON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Rexford G. Tugwell, who once helped run the American government, now teaches London students about it.

The former top brain trust under President Roosevelt is a visiting professor at the London school of economics, lecturing on American government and political science.

The 58-year-old economist, whose career as a government planner was constantly stormy, lives quietly today in a London hotel.

British Life
He came here on invitation of the London school, settling himself and his family so firmly into the British educational routine that his presence passed almost unnoticed. His two sons are enrolled in a typical country school in Devon.

Tugwell said he expects to teach a year in London, then return next spring to his regular position as professor of political science at the University of Chicago.
