Want To Write for Living? It Can Be a Tough Task

By HAL BOYLE NEW YORK Nov. 7 (AP)—Millions of Americans want to be successful authors. But only 5000 really are. What defeats the rest? Robert Penn Warren, Pulitzer prize winning novelist, says this is one of the chief reasons:

Warren is an expert at taking the beating of popular indifference to his work. For 20 years this Kentucky-born poet, editor and university professor has been hailed by critics as one of the nation's finest literary craftsmen.

But over a 17-year period he wrote a biography, three books of poetry, and three novels before the public woke up to his merit. He hit the jackpot with the third novel "All the King's Men."

He is a slow writer and pecked out "All the King's Men" over a ten-year period. "I know how it feels to be a frustrated writer—at least six days a week," he said. "I write with a typewriter. Can't read it if I don't."

Writing poetry is more pleasant than prose. You can lie on your back and mumble longer before you have to get up and go to the typewriter.

Warren has never made as much as \$1000 from a poetry book and doubts if any poet in America—except possibly Robert Frost—gets a livable income from verse alone.

"Get a job," he advised. "Then try to write and see what happens. I always had a teaching job. When you have a job, you can write the way you want to and hope for the best. You don't have to count on it for the groceries."

The World Today By DEWITT MACKENZIE AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

This is the 32nd anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution that overthrew the Czarist government and established a Red regime which in the succeeding generation has extended its domination to almost a third of the globe.

It is one of history's most amazing conquests. Not only has Soviet Russia created the huge Red bloc of nations which owe allegiance to Moscow, but a gentile have penetrated even the uncivilized parts of the world to establish bolshevist cells which pledge their fealty to Moscow.

The chief weapons employed in this "world revolution" have been ideological persuasion and outright force. Of these the strong-arm method has been responsible for most of the success.

Britain's socialist Prime Minister Attlee adds another weapon which mustn't be overlooked. He says Russia is using its United Nations veto as an "instrument of power politics and for furthering the imperialistic aims of the Soviet Union."

Czechoslovakia does indeed provide an excellent example of how bolshevism works. She cannot of course be put in the same class with some of the Balkan states which still are primitive in many respects.

Then came the second World War and Russian military occupation toward the close of the conflict. Since that time the country has been largely Sovietized.

A high point on the business chart was the steady movement of goods at retail in sharp contrast to the decline in sales since a million people or more were cut off from regular payrolls by the labor crisis.

The National City bank of New York said in its monthly business letter that when steel and coal production is under full swing again "the prospect for a satisfactory fall and winter business should be considered excellent."
