The business meeting completed the afternoon.

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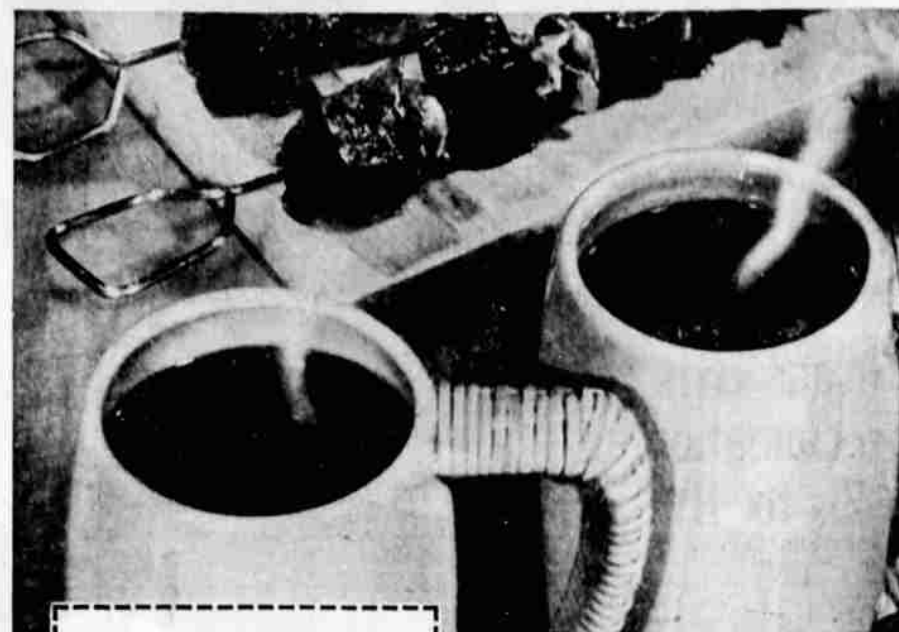
SEATTLE, Nov. 8 (AP)—A coast guard motor lifeboat removed the last crew members from the apparently doomed freighter Andalusia yesterday.

The lifeboat removed the captain and eight crew members from the stricken ship. Other crew members were taken off four days ago, after the ship was driven aground because of a fire in its engine room. It is on a reef near the tip of the Olympic peninsula.
