

State Scores In Tacoma Attack Case

TACOMA, Nov. 9 (AP)—The state scored one of its major victories yesterday in the drawn-out trial of 10 youths charged with the mass rape of a Tacoma housewife when it succeeded in gaining admission of the defendants' signed confessions to evidence.

Superior Court Judge Max Church permitted the confessions to stand over sharp objections by defense attorneys. The judge ruled that the body of the crime had been established and that submission of the confessions was in order.

'Adults Only'
The lurid hearing, proceeding with admission limited to "adults only," brought testimony earlier yesterday from Edgar Edmiston, a gas station attendant, who said he saw three men and a nude woman drive into his station about 8 p.m. on May 27, the night of the alleged attacks.

"One of the fellows that got out of the front seat had all her clothes hanging from his pockets," Edmiston testified.

Jaundice Threat In Willamette

EUGENE, Nov. 9 (AP)—The Lane county health officer warned the Willamette city community last night that an outbreak of jaundice was caused by polluted water.

Dr. A. Triolo reported eight cases were diagnosed yesterday. He said the entire population of 1000 was menaced by the disease.

The health officer said the water table for the community, near Oakridge, is polluted and most wells and springs in the area are unsafe. He said the eight cases were in five different families. He said the danger to the community would not abate until a safe water supply was assured.

Bobby Ray Lee, 1835 Johnson avenue, Pacific Fruit Express company employe, is the third Klamath resident to be charged with violation of the Oregon school bus law since September.

Lee was charged yesterday morning with failure to stop behind a school bus discharging children. The violation occurred on highway 66.

Lee appeared in justice court yesterday afternoon and was fined \$10.



Oregon's Guard Over 5,000 Mark

PORTLAND, Nov. 9 (AP)—With a recruiting deadline 10 days away, Oregon's national guard units already have an enrollment of over 5000 for the first time.

Major Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, state adjutant general, said October enrollment had added 290 to the ground and air units. The total of 4501 enlisted men and 310 officers is the second largest west of the Rockies.

Rilea said the ground troops have 4130 officers and men and the air units 860. He said the totals represent only 44 per cent of the quota assigned by the department of the army.

Farm Area Electrified

ONE, Nov. 9 (AP)—Electricity surged for the first time into a mid-Columbia area of 600 farms near here yesterday.

A new substation of the Bonneville power administration went into operation. It relayed power to about 50 farms. Main lines are installed for service to another 550 farms in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties. Connections will be made when transformers and feeder lines are installed.

BPA District Manager Henry R. Richmond Jr., said the delivery represented the end of a 10-year program of the Columbia basin electric co-operative at Heppner.

Portland Club In Dutch Again

PORTLAND, Nov. 9 (AP)—District attorney J. B. McCourt prepared today to start legal proceedings to close up the Melody club, scene of four liquor violation arrests in a month.

The fourth was early yesterday, two days after the third involving illegal sale of liquor.

McCourt said the state liquor control commission already has asked a court to restrain the owners from maintaining a common nuisance. It asked a closure for two years, or until there was assurance it had cleaned up. The club has no liquor license.
