Butterscotch Candy Cake Quick-method recipe

Sift together into a large bowl:
2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
2 1/2 teaspoons double-action baking powder (3 1/2 teaspoons single-action)
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar

Add:

1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
