The august athletic body booted Corvallis high school from the OSAA — at least temporarily. The reason: A group of Corvallis students, with typical pre-game zeal, planned to "beat Albany" signs on Albany's Hudson field, site of this Friday's district 4 crucial.

As this is being written (on Wednesday) a decision had not been reached on when the OSAA would be lifted. In fact, it was not certain it would be lifted.

I'm certainly not advocating vandalism, but painting of signs is as much a part of football as directing boos and cat-calls at the umpire is a part of baseball.

The move by the OSAA came on the eve of the important district 4 clash. Both Corvallis and Albany are in the running for the district title.

It would come as no great surprise if the athletic directing body rose up in all its glory and disqualified a jubilant, victorious team for uprooting goal posts following a football win.

With what, in my opinion, is over-specialization of football and penalties similar to the one just socked to Corvallis, football could well become just about as exciting as a spinster's tea party.

District Picture

Technically, no team is in the saddle until the district fathers give their blessings. However, when the smoke clears away on various state gridirons this week-end, the issue will be settled in most of the loops.

Actually, Klamath Falls and Marshfield are "in" in districts 2 and 3. However, a Bend victory would throw district 2 into a three-way Pel-Cavemen-Bend tie.

LaGrande should walk into district 1 without too much trouble. Its foe will be Baker, already beaten by the Tigers 45-0 early in the season.

Milwaukie will meet either Estacada or Woodburn Friday for the district 5 crown. According to recent AP reports, Hillsboro had clinched district 6 but actually it must wallop a weak Newberg team Friday to apply the clincher.

District 4 remains in a tangle. Voting will have three or four nominees after games this week.

It will be either Central Catholic or Scappoose for district 7 and Grant and Roosevelt mix for district 8 Thursday.

Volleyball

Latest city venture, sponsored by the recreation department, is a volleyball tournament. Originally six teams were signed for play while plans called for an eight-team league.

Two teams, in the meantime, dropped and now efforts are being made to pick up four more volleyball crews.

Late Note

Pels, Owls in Armistice Day Gridiron Scraps

Klamath Travels to Lair of Lava Bears

The Klamath Pelicans travel to Bend tomorrow for the annual Armistice Day clash against the Lava Bears. The game, although figured as a win for the Pels, could well be a disastrous anti-climax to a successful season of Pelican league gridfraz.

In nine tilts to date the Lava Bears have won four and lost five. However, losing games, with the exception of the Medford game, were all close affairs.

The Bruins lost to Medford, 32-14, in a game that Pel Backfield Coach Dutch French says was closer than indicated by the score. Both teams ran up 10 first downs and fumbles and breaks went to the Black Tornado.

They lost to Corvallis, 14-13; Eugene, 13-6; Salem, 7-0, and Albany, 13-6. All games were nip and tuck and well could have gone the other way.

Comparative scores, of course, favor Klamath. In addition to Medford, waxed by the Pelicans, 21-6; Springfield fell to Klamath 45-6 and Salem lost, 7-0, to Bob Hendershott's charges.

FOUR WINS
 On the winning side of the books, the Bruins have beaten Madras, 25-7; Cleveland, 19-6; Springfield, 19-12, and Redmond, 26-0.

The win would mark the Pels' eighth straight of the season and send them into the state quarterfinals without a conference loss.

Joe Nichols, who suffered a painful leg injury in the Grants Pass game, has been idle since, but reports have it he'll be ready to go Friday before the Bend Armistice Day crowd.

The big question mark on the Pelican roster is Fullback Joe Demetrakos, still hobbling Wednesday with a charley-horse.

If Demetrakos is not at full strength, Jim DeChaineau would see action at the fullback spot.

No other injuries are plaguing the Pels with the boys over the recent flu seize, although Coach Bob Hendershott was confined at home with the flu Wednesday.

The Pels leave town Friday morning, 7:45, via Greyhound.

BIG, TOUGH
 Information from Klamath scouts and Bend publicity centers report the Bears as "big and tough although generally inexperienced."

Bend uses a balanced line with the majority of plans run from the T formation although occasionally they switch to single-wing and box formations.

Sparkplug of the green Bend forward wall is Letterman Center Tom Niebergall. Ron Abbott, fullback, and Gene Holliday, halfback, are power runners. The scabbards are Ken Brown and Jim Wade, both halfbacks.

If Demetrakos does not start, the opening Pelican backfield will probably be Bob McPherson at quarter, Joe Nichols and Gene Carlson at halfbacks and DeChaineau at full.

However, Gaynor Huck may get a starting assignment at a halfback post. It's a cinch the small speedster will see plenty of action.

PELICAN LINE
 The line will probably see Dorin Van Lue and Tom Schubert, ends; John Witte and Tom Abner, tackles; Roy Lundgren and Dick Petzoldt, guards, and Keith Donahoo, center.

The Bend fray always holds promise of being a donnybrook, with the Lava Bears thirsting to clip Pelican wings.

Last year Klamath won over Bend, 14-12.

Klamath Falls has already clinched the district 2 title although a loss to the Lava Bears would take some polish from the quarterfinal game, probably against La Grande.

PCL Directors Will Discuss "Little Series"

Yaqui Kid Trounces Lipscomb

It took young Yaqui Kid just fifteen seconds short of 20 minutes to put Jack (The Lip) Lipscomb out of commission in the armory ring last night—but it was referee Buck Davidson who was showered with cheers.

Lipscomb, famous for his sadistic tactics, was able to get away with very little mayhem with Davidson keeping a sharp watch on proceedings.

The Kid earned the second and deciding fall in the no-time limit affair, with an assist from Buck.

While The Lip was busy applying a series of choke holds on the Kid, Davidson kept active breaking up the party. Lipscomb aimed a blow at Davidson and the wrestling nimrod floored Lipscomb with a flying drop-kick. Yaqui Kid took advantage of the assist and body-slammed Lipscomb and pinned him for the deciding fall in 5 minutes, 27 seconds.

Felton Draw With Pellone Unpopular

Detroit Fighter Again the Center of Controversy

DETROIT, Nov. 10 (AP)—Young Lester Felton of Detroit, who is fast becoming one of the most controversial figures in boxing, was in the headlines today as time because he did not win a fight.

The 20-year-old Negro welterweight zoomed into national prominence October 21 when he got an unpopular decision over Kid Gavilan of Cuba in a fight here that touched off probes by the state boxing commission and police.

Felton returned to ring warfare last night and wound up with a ten-round draw at Olympia stadium with rough Tony Pellone of New York.

Most of the 8967 fans and the newspapermen thought Felton had won.

Judges Johnny Webber and Lou Jallo each called it a 50-50 fight, while Referee Clarence Rosen voted for Felton by a 54-46 margin. Under Michigan rules, explained by Boxing Commission Chairman Floyd Stevens, that was a draw.

The decision had scarcely been announced when a heated discussion broke out among Felton's handlers and boxing commission officials over scoring of the fight.

Chief issue was the card of Judge Johnny Webber, who awarded Pellone the second round by a 7-3 margin after Felton hit the canvas for a no-count.

Under Michigan rules a fighter who floors his opponent once in a round wins it by a 7-3 margin. If there is no knockdown, the greatest edge he can have is 6-4.

Webber scored it as a knockdown, but Referee Clarence Rosen said after the fight that it was not a knockdown.

Some observers said that since it was not officially a knockdown, the round should have been Pellone's only by a 6-4 margin. That would have given Felton a 51-49 advantage on Webber's card.

Commissioner Stevens went into a 10-minute huddle with his aides after the bout and announced the draw decision would stand.

Justice May Not Choo-Choo Sat.

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Nov. 10 (AP) Coach Carl Snavely said today "it is quite doubtful" that All-American Charlie Justice will play Saturday for the University of North Carolina in a football game with Notre Dame at New York.

Justice hasn't responded too well to treatment for a sprained ankle suffered against William and Mary last Saturday, Snavely said.

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GRAPEVINE
 The Kid gained the first fall in 14 minutes, 18 seconds with his famous grapevine. The Lip had just hurled the Sonora, Mex. lad from the ring, using his shaggy black hair as a handle. The Kid crawled back in and two flying butts and the grapevine did the trick.

Davidson and Maurice LaChapelle fought to a draw in the semi-windup. Both had gained one fall when the 45 minutes ran out. Buck grabbed the first fall with a surboard in 22 minutes, 25 seconds; the Frenchman evened matters with an arm stretch, followed by a hammerlock in 10 minutes, 25 seconds.

GRUELING
 It was a grueling match, with the Parisian using a head scissors to advantage and Buck lying the short-arm scissors and step-over toe hold to soften LaChapelle.

The party got rough in the third stanza with both grapplers using flying mares and body slams with gusto.

The Great Atlas took just 2:15 to the end festivities in the opener against Milwaukee's Carl Meyers but spent a full ten minutes after the bout strutting and displaying his muscles. A full nelson in the wake of body slams, chops to the chin and general mayhem spelled defeat for Meyers.

Everett Leach and Jack Ryder drew in the newsboy curtain-raiser.

Chuck Warren, Owl halfback sparkplug, was forced to the bench in the first half when a gang of Cougars allegedly gauged him out-of-bounds after the whistle. Warren came up with a seriously-gauged eye.

LEAD BLASTED

Stanford, the team that finally found itself in last company, rates to win handsily over Idaho. The big upset victory over Southern California last week was all that Stanford needed.

With only one league defeat, Stanford still has a chance for the Rose Bowl. This transition could take place by a win this week over Idaho and a walloping setback to California November 19.

The University of California at Los Angeles, also with one conference loss, entertains a rejuvenated Washington team and may be in for more trouble than expected. Washington's win over favored Oregon last week was a bracer.

Oregon State, which has coupled together triumphs over Washington State and Idaho, lines up against a hard knocking team in Michigan State. The game will be played at Portland where rainy weather could set in to level conditions.
