NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—There's going to be an all-out effort to disprove the baseball's annoying bonus rule at the December meetings, but it may run into a little opposition. Branch Rickey says he won't vote for the "Pittsburgh amendment" wiping out all bonus restrictions unless the old rule is restored which prohibits a minor league club from giving a player part of the purchase price when he is sold. Rickey explains that transfers within a chain generally are player trades involving only nominal sums, so they can't make similar offers. So it would be "murder" to allow independently-owned clubs that privilege. The original purpose of the bonus rule, of course, was to discourage offering ridiculous sums to untied kids. It didn't work. Few, if any, independents can match the bonuses which major league clubs will hand out to boys who will immediately be farmed out. Seems like it would only be giving the independents a fair break to let them make another kind of offer. But Branch apparently wants all the breaks to favor his side.

Eugene has served warning that it will expect the championship if Salem is knocked out. But that claim is disputed by Lebanon, which also gained an extra victory through the Corvallis forfeit, and—given a Salem loss—would rank first on paper.

And just to complicate the situation, Salem, if it lost, would still have a higher percentage record than Eugene: three victories and a defeat, to Eugene's four victories, one loss, and one tie.

The battles in the rest of Oregon tonight are clear-cut affairs.

REMATCH

Scappoose and Central Catholic of Portland, which battled to a scoreless tie in last year's district 7 final, meet again tonight, with Scappoose aiming at revenge for its defeat on a first-down basis last season.

Milwaukie, the top team in the northern area, and Estacada, which won the Willamette Valley league crown Tuesday night, will compete for the district 5 title at Milwaukie. The home team, which boasts a bigger score, is favored.

La Grande is an overwhelming favorite to clinch the district 1 championship in the remaining top contest tonight. The opponent is Baker, at the bottom of Blue Mountain standings.

Index

EXPLANATION—The Power Index provides a direct comparison of the relative strength of any two teams for this season to date. Thus, a 100 team has been scoring points stronger than a 50 team on their comparative records, in which scoring margin has been weighed against strength of opposition. This does not necessarily mean that a 50 team should defeat a 100 team by exactly 50 points in the future. Teams rarely follow past performance that closely. The Power Index system correlates records of all college teams and was started in 1929.
