

Food Prices Review Shows Coffee Only Big Change of Week

Changes in the retail prices of most foods, with the exception of coffee, were minor this week. Coffee, however, rose several cents a pound in many places as roasters advanced wholesale prices in an effort to catch up with their own advancing buying costs.

A basic grade of green coffee beans which roasters could buy for around 29 cents a pound only two

months ago was selling at around 32 cents this week. If such coffee had to be roasted, packaged, distributed and sold immediately, trade sources said, the consumer price would be in the neighborhood of 76 cents a pound, depending on how the coffee was blended and packed.

Still Down

Actually, retail prices still were well below that figure this week, although some nationally advertised vacuum-packed brands were selling at 68 to 72 cents a pound. Some large store chains who do their own roasting and who bought raw coffee before the market had spiraled steeply upward, were still offering bag-packed coffee below 50 cents.

Price changes elsewhere in the food picture were irregular. Pork and poultry were a little lower in most marketing centers compared with last week, while top grade eggs, good lettuce, onions, cucumbers, green peas and snap beans were slightly higher.

Winter Vegetables

Produce men hailed the first good volume arrivals of several winter vegetables such as limas from California, corn from Florida, eggplant and peppers from Texas, okra from Cuba. They said Maine potatoes were at the lowest retail prices of the year in many places.

The Dun & Bradstreet wholesale food price index this week advanced to 55.74 from last week's 55.69, with higher coffee prices chiefly responsible for the gain. The figure, representing the aggregate wholesale cost of a pound each of 31 general use foods, compared with \$6.39 in the like week last year.

Man Pleads For Wife's Murderers

SEOUL, Nov. 11 (AP)—Dr. Horace H. Underwood, American missionary and educator, has asked clemency for four young Koreans condemned to death for slaying his wife.

The kindly missionary appealed by letter to President Syngman Rhee. The government made public this part of the letter.

"My dear wife had a deep and strong love for Koreans of every class and especially for the young people of Korea. It was her hope and it is our hope that the people of Korea may more and more come to know Jesus Christ and to have—not death—but a more abundant life. It is not our wish that any Korean should die because of us or because of our family."

No Execution

Dr. Underwood said the slayers deserved punishment "for crimes against this country and against civilized law and order." But he expressed belief the 60-year-old Mrs. Underwood would not want her slayers executed.

Mrs. Underwood was shot by two hooded gunmen at her home last March 17. At the time she was giving a tea for the wives of faculty members of Chosen Christian college, which she and her husband founded.

Last month nine members of a leftist group were tried for her murder. It was testified the gunmen intended to kill Miss Mo Yoon-sook, Korean poetess and anti-communist author. Miss Sook was a guest at the tea party.

Five other members of the group were sentenced to prison.

Teen-Age Center To Reopen

CHILQUIN — The Teen-Age center for the Wood River-Chiloquin area will re-open for the current year by Thanksgiving, if present plans of the guiding council carry through. The center, which was begun last year under the joint sponsorship of the Chiloquin PTA and the city council, is managed by an adult council of seven members, a director, and a youth council of six members, one chosen from each of the upper six grades.

Al Prescott, speaking for the adult council, stated that approximately \$150 must be expended in labor and materials before the opening date, and that money is on hand for about half that amount. The center is one of the nine county projects which will receive direct help from this year's Community Chest budget, the sum of which should carry the center through the year.

Two rooms will be used this year. Instead of one. Pool tables and dancing will occupy the room used last year and ping pong and card tables will be placed in the adjoining room.

Oregon Among Western States Whose Farmers Cash Receipts Are Off

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—In only two Western states have farmers bettered last year's figures for cash received from marketing their crops and livestock.

These are New Mexico and Washington.

Income figures for the first nine months of this year as made available by the agriculture department show a drop in livestock returns from all 11 states.

New Mexico and Washington made up the loss in crop marketing.

Idaho, Arizona and Washington also all reported larger incomes from this source in September, compared with the same month a year ago.

Figures for the states (1948 in parentheses) include:

Washington, livestock \$136,151,000 (\$147,012,000); crops \$242,426,000 (corrected coming here).

Oregon, livestock \$106,183,000 (\$117,643,000); crops \$130,304,000 (\$139,838,000); total \$236,487,000 (\$257,481,000).

California, livestock \$533,067,000 (\$616,924,000); crops \$824,713,000 (\$861,965,000); total \$1,357,800,000 (\$1,478,889,000).

\$10,000 Awarded In Road Death

DALLAS, Ore., Nov. 11 (AP)—A \$10,000 verdict was won by Mrs. Edith Brooks in her suit against

A. P. Coats Lumber company, Tillamook, for the highway accident death of her husband.

Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker said the Tuesday verdict was the largest sum he had known to be awarded in an auto death claim. Until recently \$10,000 was the maximum allowable. A new law lifts the maximum to \$15,000 and it was for the latter sum that Mrs. Brooks sued.

Her husband was killed when his car and a lumber truck collided north of here last May.

Jet Helicopter Announced

SEATTLE, Nov. 11 (AP)—Invention of a jet-powered helicopter was announced yesterday by a Seattle airman.

Horace T. Pentecost is the inventor. The jets are mounted on the tips of the big rotary propeller that lifts the tiny craft. He calls the 175-pound creation the Firefly.

The 18-foot rotor, Pentecost said, is driven at about 500 revolutions a minute by the 20-horsepower jets. The inventor said he hopes to fly it for the first time soon after the first of the year.

1st Marine Division Vets Sought

A search is being made for around 25,000 veterans who served with the 1st marine division overseas between August, 1943, and September, 1945.

Each former member of the division is entitled to a free copy of "The Old Breed," official history of the division written by George McMillan. Present home addresses of the men who fought with the famed division are needed for distribution of the books.

George McMillan, the author, was a combat correspondent attached to the 1st division. His 490-page book is illustrated by Roland James, also an ex-marine.

Eligible marine vets are asked to send their present mailing address to the 1st marine history board, 1115 17th street North, Washington, D. C.

The speakers will stress the jurisdictional problem that exists between the state courts and the federal courts over law enforcement on the Klamath Indian reservation. Preaching will be at 11 o'clock by the Rev. P. C. Alderson. Also this Sunday there will be an investment program.

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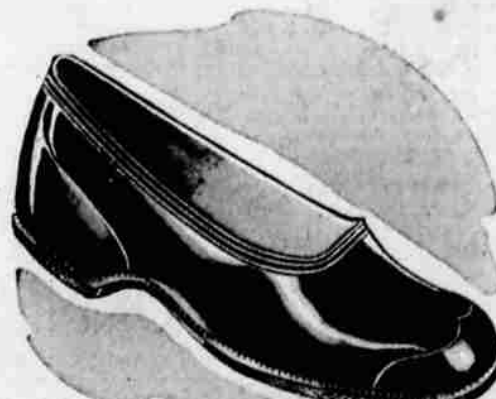
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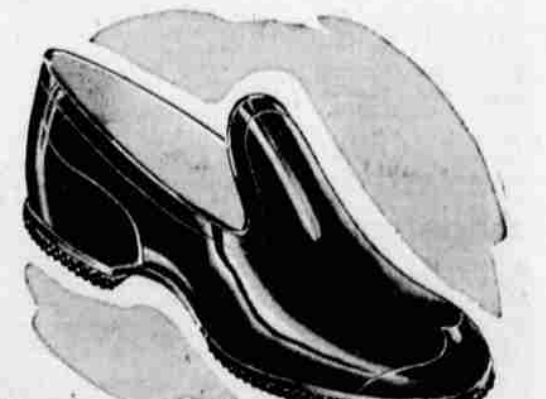
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
