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The Bible Story

JOSEPH



EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the sixth of a series of studies from the Old Testament. The text is condensed from selections by Houston Harris for the new book, "In Our Image," illustrated by Guy Rowe. It is also from the book.

Now Israel loved Joseph more than all his children because he was the son of his old age; and he made him a coat of many colours. And his brethren hated him.

And Joseph dreamed a dream, and told his brethren; and they hated him more. And he said, Hear I pray you, this dream. Behold, we were binding sheaves in the field, and my sheaf arose, and stood upright; and your sheaves stood round about, and made obeisance to my sheaf.

And his brethren said, Shalt thou reign over us? or shalt thou have dominion over us? And they hated him yet the more.

And he dreamed another dream, and told his brethren, Behold, the sun and the moon and the eleven stars made obeisance to me. And he told his father, and his father rebuked him, and said unto him, Shalt I and thy mother and thy brethren indeed come to bow down ourselves to thee to the earth?

And his brethren went to feed their father's flock. And Israel said unto Joseph, Go, see whether it be well with thy brethren, and with the flocks; and bring me word again.

And Joseph went, and found them in Dothan. And when they saw him, they conspired against him to slay him. And they stripped Joseph out of his coat of many colours; and they took him, and cast him into a pit.

And they sat down to eat bread; and behold, a company of Ishmeelites came from Gilead with their camels bearing spicery and balm and myrrh, going to Egypt. And Judah said unto his brethren, What profit is it if we slay our brother? Come, and let us sell him. And they drew Joseph out of the pit, and sold Joseph to the Ishmeelites for twenty pieces of silver; and they brought Joseph into Egypt, and sold him unto Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh's and captain of the guard. And his master saw that the LORD was with him.

And Joseph found grace in his sight, and he served him; and he made him overseer over his house. And Joseph was a goodly person and his master's wife cast her eyes upon Joseph; and she said, Lie with me. But he refused, and said, How can I do this great wickedness and sin against God? And she caught him by his garment; and he left his garment in her hand, and fled, and he laid up his garment by her, until his lord came home. And she spake unto him, saying, The LORD

three days shall Pharaoh hang thee on a tree; and the birds shall eat thy flesh from off thee.

And it came to pass the third that he made a feast. And he restored the chief butler, and he gave the cup into Pharaoh's hand; But he hanged the chief baker: as Joseph had interpreted. Yet did not the chief butler remember Joseph, but forgot him.

And it came to pass at the end of two years, that Pharaoh dreamed: And in the morning his spirit was troubled; and he called for all the magicians of Egypt, and all the wise men; and told them his dream; but none could interpret.

Then spake the chief butler saying, In the captain of the guard's house, there was there with us a young man, an Hebrew, and he interpreted to us our dreams. And as he interpreted, so it was.

Then Pharaoh called Joseph, and they brought him hastily out of the dungeon: And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, I have heard say of thee, that thou canst understand a dream to interpret it. And Joseph answered, It is not in me: God shall give Pharaoh an answer of peace. And Pharaoh said, In my dream, I stood upon the bank of the river: And there came out of the river seven kine, fatfleshed and well favoured; and they fed in a meadow: And seven other kine came up after them, poor and ill favoured and lean-fleshed: And the lean and the ill favoured kine did eat up the seven fat kine: And it could not be known that they had eaten them; but they were still ill favoured, as at the beginning. So I awoke, and I saw in my dream, and seven ears came up in one stalk, full and good: And seven ears, withered, thin, and blasted with the east wind, sprung up after them: And the thin ears devoured the seven good ears. And Joseph said unto Pharaoh, God hath shewed Pharaoh what he is about to do. The seven good kine are seven years; and the seven good ears are seven years: the dream is one. And the seven thin and ill favoured kine that came up after them are seven years; and the seven empty ears blasted with the east wind shall be seven years of famine. Behold, there come seven years of great plenty throughout all the land of Egypt: And there shall arise after them seven years of famine. And God will shortly bring it to pass. Now therefore let Pharaoh look out a man discreet and wise, and set him over the land of Egypt. And let him appoint officers over the land, and take up the fifth part of the land of Egypt in the seven plentiful years, and lay up corn under the hand of Pharaoh, and keep food in the cities. And that food shall be for store against the seven years of famine; that the land perish not through the famine.

And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, Forasmuch as God hath shewed thee all this, there is none so discreet and wise as thou: Thou shalt be over my house, and according unto thy word shall all my people be ruled: only in the throne will I be greater than thou.

And Joseph went throughout all Egypt. And in the seven plentiful years the earth brought forth abundantly. And he laid up the food in the cities. And Joseph gathered corn as the sand of the sea, very much, until he left numbering; for it was without number.

And the seven years of plentifulness were ended. And the seven years of dearth began to come, as Joseph had said: and the dearth was in all lands; but in all the land of Egypt there was bread. And when the people cried for bread, Pharaoh said, Go unto Joseph: what he saith to you, do. And Joseph opened all the storehouses, and sold

Columbia Basin Land Eroding

PORTLAND, Nov. 11 (AP)—Nearly every one of the Columbia basin's million and a half acres of farmlands is eroding to some extent, an agronomist said here yesterday.

Harold Tower, Portland, told the Oregon Association of Soil Conservation districts, that extent of erosion varied with land conditions, with some 400,000 acres of steep and shallow ground in "poor condition." He recommended grass planting in such poor quality land.

Even some good wheat-producing land is suffering erosion, he added. He suggested such practices as stubble mulch tillage, and said it would not reduce yields if nitrogen fertilizer is used.

Moulding Workers Vote Union Down

Employees of Klamath Lake Moulding company's sawmill division voted 114 to 69 this week to have no union represent the employees as bargaining agent with the company.

The 69 pro-union votes were for the AFL lumber and sawmill workers.
