Lower Payroll Tax Rates

Salem, Nov. 11 (AP) — At least 8359 employers, or slightly more than half of the employers covered in Oregon, will get lower payroll tax rates next year under the new unemployment compensation law.

The unemployment compensation commission said it now is sending out notices of the lower tax rates. Under the new schedule, only 8000 employers will be paying the normal 2.7 per cent payroll tax rate. The others will get rates ranging down to 3 of 1 per cent.
