Two Candidates Toss Hats in Ring Against Grange Master Tompkins

PORTLAND, Nov. 11 (AP)—State grange headquarters today reported two candidates will oppose Grange Master Merton Tompkins for reelection.

With nominations for the biennial election closed, Victor Boehl, Grants Pass, master of the Josephine Pomona grange, and Elmer McClure, Milwaukie, state grange overseer, were listed for the ballot. McClure's candidacy came as a surprise. Grangers had expected him to run as Tompkins' successor

but not in opposition if the state leader stood for reelection to a fifth term.

CVA Foe
Boehl is opposed to a Columbia valley administration which has been endorsed by the state grange convention and is backed by Tompkins. Boehl was expected to gain some support too from groups that disliked Tompkins' irritation over some 20 legislators voting for a revision of Oregon's referendum law. Hood River county and Klamath county granges are among those which have attacked Tompkins on the attempted purge.

Three men were nominated for McClure's overseer post: William G. Howes, Gold Hill; Walter Webb, Mosier, and Clarence Carter, La Grande.

State Secretary Bertha Beck, Portland, and Lecturer Beulah Moore, Oregon City, are unopposed for re-election.

Lakeview Chest Funds Held Back

LAKEVIEW—Delay by Community Chest workers in turning in the donations they have received was mainly responsible for the low showing at the chest headquarters Wednesday evening. Of the \$11,000 budget, only \$3931.37 was on hand, said Mrs. Jo Elliott, clerk.

Mrs. Elliott said that receipts from house-to-house solicitations have been good. There has been no report from the committee on special contributions, industrial and other central groups, however. Of the rural communities, only New Pine Creek had reported with \$62 turned in from that section.

Mrs. Elliott was aware that much more has been received by workers but she cannot count it as received until it is turned in at her office.

One Shot Kills Two Elk Hunters

SPOKANE, Nov. 11 (AP)—Two Spokane elk hunters were fatally injured by a single shot near Anas-tone, Asotin county, yesterday. Another hunter was recovering in a Yakima hospital after wandering for four days in the Cascade mountains.

Victims of the freak accident were William R. Nolan, 40, and William E. Hamilton, about 28, both of Spokane. Their deaths brought to three the fatality toll of the current elk hunting season.

Asotin County Coroner Tom Jordan said the single bullet was fired by James Jones, about 45, of Pullman. Jones and his son, Robert, about 21, were released on their own recognizance. No charge was filed against them.

Lethal Shot
Jordan said the bullet passed through Hamilton's body below the heart and struck Nolan. The latter died quickly of a severed leg artery. Hamilton lived for two and a half hours but died as Jones and his son carried him to a road for aid.

Meanwhile, another tragedy was narrowly averted when two unidentified hunters found Bob Millet, 54, of Sedro Woolley, near collapse on a forest trail west of Yakima in the Cascades. Millet had been missing for four days in the Raven Roost area. He was taken to a Yakima hospital and placed under treatment for exposure.

Election Trouble Subsiding

BOGOTA, Colombia, Nov. 11 (AP)—Pre-election fighting was reported subsiding in most parts of Colombia today as troops held the country under virtual martial law.

President Mariano Ospina Perez' conservative party said "the violence against authorities and citizens now has found the necessary dike."

Ospina on Wednesday proclaimed a state of siege, a modified version of martial law, and placed troops at strategic points throughout the country.

There were unconfirmed reports of clashes between conservatives and opposition liberal party members in the interior, but the government said most of Colombia was calm.
