PORTLAND, Nov. 11 (AP) — This city's one way traffic grid system in the midtown sector faces another postponement — likely until after the first of the year.

Parents-Patrons Organize Minor Liquor Sales Fight
Appointment of a parent-student committee to confer with William Spangler, member of the Oregon liquor control commission, on the possibility of getting stiffer penalization of tavern operators and others who sell liquor to minors, was the outcome of the November Parents and Patrons meeting at Klamath Union high school auditorium on Wednesday evening.

Mrs. Matt Finnigan, vice president, presiding in the absence of Mrs. E. A. Geary, president, named Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Juckland, Mrs. Harvey Borgman, James W. Pluniger, Howard Strode of the juvenile office and Ronnie Lowell, senior student.

This action was taken following a panel discussion under the leadership of Paul Angstead, vice principal. Representing the faculty on this panel was Paul McCall, basketball coach and chairman of the coaches board which was organized last year to foster a better spirit in athletics. Howard Strode of the juvenile office presented a few facets of teen-age difficulties from his side of the picture. Ronnie Lowell, an outstanding all-around student at KUHS, presented the students' point of view, and Jack Linman, a member of the school board, was chosen for the panel because of his interest in youngsters and the schools.

In a brief summary before introducing his speakers, Angstead emphasized the large percentage of students who must depend on the high schools to prepare them for the responsibilities of citizens—boys and girls who do not enter high school in preparation for college.

"Knowledge and skills are not enough," Angstead pointed out. "Rather it's each individual's attitude toward his responsibilities to a group that means the most when it comes to adult citizenship. The responsibility of parents and teachers is to act as guide posts and counselors."

For the panel discussion, he explained that he had selected one specific problem — the activities children have on their own, not their supervised activities. And it's the former, he said, for which people have a tendency to blame the schools.

Coach McCall explained the purpose of the coaches' board and how it is attempting to help and advise the school's athletes. He listed the following seven basic rules for all athletic participants throughout their high school years:

No stealing of school equipment; no stealing on athletic trips or at home; no violation of civil laws; no smoking or drinking during a high school athletic career; keeping of regular hours (10 p. m. on week nights and 12 o'clock midnight on week-ends); conduct above reproach at all times; regular practice attendance.

All violations must be in writing and handed to the board, he stated. These are kept on file. Whenever a student is called before the board for a hearing on rule violations, the parents are personally invited to attend.

Strode commented on some of the cases that come into his office, which are indirectly connected with

and openly at school meetings, and that the student leaders should set higher standards that they demand be maintained.

Jack Linman considered it more a matter of blind luck than anything else, getting three youngsters of his own through high school without any serious trouble. He placed parents in two categories: those who were models of behavior in their youth and who do not expect their sons and daughters to be any different; and those who were not but adopt an attitude of "well, I came through all right; let the chips fall where they may."

Considering the length of preparation it takes for school teaching, and the responsibility it entails, Linman expressed the belief that teachers are underpaid, and that it's amazing, more than otherwise, that there aren't more weaknesses and inefficiency found in this vocation.

During a general discussion at the close of the program, State Representative E. A. Geary, who was present, gave his opinion that we have plenty of laws, but that they need enforcement.

"They will be enforced when the people insist on it, and I am positive that if a strong group of parents will get behind this law which prohibits selling of liquor to minors, they will get action from the liquor commission. If not from this body, then they can get action from the governor."
